

#### **National Executive Committeeman November 2025 Newsletter**

Happy Veterans Day and Thanksgiving. This is your monthly update of everything National in The American Legion.

National Commander Dan Wiley will be visiting Arkansas November  $12^{th} - 14^{th}$ . His arrival was delayed one day because he was invited to attend a meeting with VA Secretary Collins. This limits his availability to visit Arkansas Posts to only Thursday and Friday morning. His itinerary is posted on the Department website.

The National Fall Meetings were held in Indianapolis October 6<sup>th</sup> – 9<sup>th</sup>. Thank you, Commander Tony Gordon, Jake Greeling, and Kirk Williams, for attending and representing Arkansas within our National Organization.

The NEC met October 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup>. I have attached a link to these minutes and adopted resolutions on the Department website. Here is a brief summary of the Commission reports and actions taken by the NEC:

- 1. The Finance Commission reported that the new Customer Relationship Management System is under budget and on schedule to be completed by December 2026. They expect to end 2025 with a budget surplus of \$4.3 million. National is employing 257 personnel in authorized positions.
- 2. The National Securities Commission recommended approval of 3 resolutions: AFE Medal for Honduras Service, MOH for Michael Ollis, and Support for NATO Expansion.
- 3. The Media & Communications Commission reported that the *Legion* magazine continues as a top-level reader's publication. Paper and production costs increases will be a factor. They are adjusting their methods of delivery for how Americans engage with media.
- 4. The Convention Commission reported the success of the 2025 convention. Planning is on schedule for the 2026 Louisville, KY convention. Future sites are: 2027 Kansas City, 2028 Columbus, 2029 Indianapolis, 2030 Salt Lake, and 2031 Pittsburgh.
- 5. Americanism Commission reported the success of the 100-years of American Legion Baseball tournament and has additional emphasis on America's 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of independence. New essay questions have been developed for the Samsung American Legion Scholarship application. The CFW has approved nine grants totaling \$851,542 for 2026 and TFA has issued 34,251 grants this year. The move to Hillsdale College for the National Oratorical Contested is a success. The Commission has produced a revised "Definition of Americanism.
- 6. Internal Affairs Commission has set the 2026 membership goal at 1.367 million. The online renewal system is working well. The National Flag Foundation has invited the ALR to escort the American Flag from Pittsburgh, PA to Washington D.C. for the "Light to Unite" July 4<sup>th</sup>. A toolkit is available to help Posts promote America 250 Activities. Upcoming Training Tuesday schedule includes Service Animals, Community Engagement, and Post Conflict Resolution. The next National Regional Information Conferences will be Jan. 31<sup>st</sup> and Feb. 7<sup>th</sup>. CPRs will be revised. Arkansas is one of only 13 Departments that had a 100% CPR submission rate.
- 7. VA&R Commission brought forward 19 resolutions recommended for adoption. Some of these are significant and will be forwarded for Legislative action. Our VA Claims training (ALAT) has seen 629 completers of the four available courses.

- 8. VE&E Commission recommended approval of one resolution Expanding Access to Capital for Veteran-Owned Small Businesses.
- 9. The National Legislative Commission provided updates on current and pending legislation including 14 bills that affect VA&R. Additional updates were provided on National Security issues including shipbuilding capacity and Defense spending. The NDAA was still not passed within the Senate.
- 10. Marketing Commission announced that The American Legion is the Official Veteran Service Organization of the Army-Navy Game through 2028. The Commission has developed a large Partnership Portfolio. Our Be The One brand awareness continues to elevate The American Legion's national presence.

Upcoming 2026 National meetings are: Washington Conference March 1-4, Spring Meetings May 4-7, National Convention Aug 28-Sep 3, and Fall Meetings Oct 5-8.

#### **LEGAL OPINION**

Subject: The American Legion, the Sons of The American Legion and the four rules of an American Legion Program

For 50 years, the Sons of The American Legion (SAL) has co-existed at all levels of The American Legion. However, this has also created a perception that SAL members have the same rights and privileges as those in The American Legion, and this misinterpretation of the rules, which has gone largely unchecked or uncorrected in some areas, is starting to cause some very real problems for the organization. Recently, this has grown into a larger concern as we hear reports of Posts being audited and, when asked for their membership rolls, submitting the names of SAL members in addition to those of regular members.

This opinion seeks to clarify for everyone that the Sons of The American Legion is a program, not simply a cheaper alternative that comes with the same rights and privileges as a traditional member. Further, leadership at all levels – Post, District, Department and National – must be knowledgeable on what the rules governing veterans and non-profit organizations are and safeguard the integrity of our organization by ensuring that no person or group jeopardizes our future by operating in a manner not consistent with the laws and regulations set by Congress and the IRS.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Shortly after the end of hostilities in World War I in Paris, France, LTC Theodore Roosevelt – the oldest son of the former president – had a conversation with George White, a fellow servicemember and editor of The Oregonian, a Portland newspaper; from this discussion, The American Legion would be born. Roosevelt would suggest the immediate establishment of a new servicemen's organization that would include all AEF members, as well as those soldiers who remained stateside as members of the military during the war. Roosevelt and White advocated this proposal ceaselessly until they found sufficient support at headquarters to move forward with the plan. In September 1919, Congress formally recognized the creation of The American Legion when both Houses of Congress passed our congressional charter and signed it into law.

Congress has deemed it in the national interest to afford congressionally chartered organizations some latitude to raise money and lobby Congress that is not available to many other non-profits. As one non-profit trade publication noted:

Above all, 501(c)(19) organizations offer financial, medical, psychological, and social support to veterans, their families, and the community. Through rehabilitation programs, support networks, and advocacy, these groups enhance veterans' mental health, employment opportunities, and overall well-being. These programs strive to secure a better future for those who have served. However, their impact extends far beyond supporting veterans, as they provide vital assistance to entire communities by mobilizing trained veteran volunteers in fields such as logistics, emergency response, and more during disasters.

At the 1932 National Convention in Portland, OR, The American Legion, while in general session, voted to approve Resolution 28, which established a youth program called "the Sons of the Legion." The Committee on Junior Activities called for "The National Organization of The American Legion to approve, encourage, and foster organizations of sons of members of The American Legion." Resolution 456 adopted at the 14th National Convention, states in the two whereas clauses "In the propagation of an organization for such boys' future around a fine idea, and assist in the bringing out the best type of citizenship," and "[a]n organization of this sort will bring the father closer to his son and make a better Legionnaire of him." The first resolve clause states, "One, that The American Legion officially propagate, recognize, and sponsor an organization to be known as the Sons of The American Legion." Upon the adoption of Resolution 456, it was believed, "Because The American Legion is such a unique organization, with eligibility so highly restricted, it can have no successor. But it can have an heir to whom it can bequeath all its treasured heritage."

#### THE PROBLEM

We are hearing more and more anecdotal evidence (and indeed some is even being sent to us) that various Departments and Posts are incorrectly interpreting the IRS code regarding the SAL, and, crucially, may be taking actions that could jeopardize The American Legion's non-profit status.

Congress sets the membership eligibility criteria for The American Legion, and the laws that govern it are found in Title 36 of the United States Code, Chapter 217, which deals exclusively with our organization. Eligibility is addressed explicitly in 36 USC 21703, a provision most recently amended with the passage of the Legion Act in 2019, and the Internal Revenue Service has promulgated rules based on what the Congressional intent was in the enactment of those laws. For us, the problem arises because Congress and the IRS have created differing rules for veterans of various conflicts, rules that largely do not apply to the SAL.

The IRS, in its Audit Technique Guide for Veterans Organizations, defines a member of a 501(c)19 with the following characteristics:

- **1.** An individual eligible for membership under the constitution and bylaws of the veterans' organization.
- 2. May attend and vote at membership meetings.
- **3.** Hold office in the organization.
- **4.** Participate in State or National Conventions.
- **5.** Posts remit membership dues for the individual to the central organization.

#### FOUR RULES OF A SUBSIDIARY PROGRAM

SAL squadrons, detachments, and the national organization are not stand-alone Veteran Service Organizations; rather, they must co-exist through the adoption and sponsorship from a post and cannot have their own EIN or tax-exempt status. This means that the SAL is under the full autonomy of its sponsoring post. If the post chooses to allow the squadron to use the post's EIN and tax-exempt status, that would be predicated on whether the squadron (program) is in full compliance with the Four Rules of a Program. Moreover, the rights and privileges of a program are not the same as those of a Legionnaire, or member of the American Legion Auxiliary. For example, the post bar, restaurant, canteen, or other social activity is intended for Legion members (veterans) of the post, their bona fide guests, and members of the Auxiliary unit, with the revenue remaining in the tax-exempt category. The IRS defines a bona fide guest as an individual a member invites to participate in an activity and pays for his expenses. If the guest pays for his own recreation or food, he isn't a bona fide guest. Social non-members are not eligible for membership in The American Legion. The members of the SAL squadron would be considered social non-members, and therefore, any sales or revenue generated from social non-members may also be subject to Unrelated Business Income (UBI) Tax by the IRS.

The IRS provides an example in the "Tax Guide for Veteran Organizations" (rev. 4-2018.):

Post A has 1,500 individuals who participate in the club's bar and gaming activities. 1,200 are veteran members who are eligible for membership as described in the post's constitution and bylaws. 300 are social non-members. Social non-members are not eligible for membership.

The veterans' organization satisfies the section 501(c)(19) membership requirements because its members are all past or present members of the U.S. Armed Forces. The social non-members are treated as members of the general public for 501(c)(19) purposes. Income from non-member sources may be subject to the unrelated business income tax.

Interpreted by the IRS, SAL members are considered social non-members when they utilize a post's social activities (if the operations are not already open to the general public and paying UBI tax for the income derived), and may generate taxable income if a Legion post member does not sign in that individual and pay for all food and entertainment for the guest. This includes all social or recreational activities of a Post not related to one of the other exempt purposes of a 501(c)19. In all such activities, an SAL member is not considered a member of the organization; therefore, revenue generated by these non-members may be considered taxable income, unless a Legion post member officially signs the non-member into the post and pays for all their purchases and services or another exception to UBI is claimed (such as volunteer labor exception).

In summary, the SAL program should be viewed as a participatory initiative that fosters the development of youth into patriotic Americans as outlined in the SAL Preamble; to uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States, foster and perpetuate a true spirit of Americanism, preserve the memories of veterans from all wars, to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state

and nation, to safeguard the principles of justice, freedom and democracy, to sanctify our friendship by our devotion to mutual helpfulness, and the last phrase; to adopt in letter and spirit all of the great principles for which The American Legion stands, and to assist in carrying on for God and Country, promotes American values and helps them become productive citizens in our society.

The SAL, as a program, is equivalent to an ALR chapter, Boys' and Girls' State, or Oratorical. All of them are Legion programs, but do not entitle participants or members to equal rights and privileges with veterans eligible for a TAL membership or to privileges commensurate with members of the American Legion Auxiliary. Certainly, no post would assume that a member of the Post's American Legion Baseball team would have unfettered access to the post commensurate with what a Legionnaire enjoys, but some Posts then turn a blind eye to members of the Sons of The American Legion, despite the SAL also being a program.

In order to deal with these issues, we have long had rules governing program operations. Attached to this opinion, you will find our latest incarnation of those rules, along with an acknowledgement section to be signed by the program participant or leader as the Post or Department may determine. Together, these four rules governing Leadership, Rules, Reports and Controls apply to all programs of The American Legion, whether they are our exclusively Youth Programs (Oratorical, Boys State, Shooting Sports, etc.) or programs like the SAL or The American Legion Riders. Regardless of what the program is — whether it be an ambulance service, a rodeo, a yacht club, a cruiser club, or some other program — the four rules apply to each of them.

### FOUR RULES OF AN AMERICAN LEGION PROGRAM

The American Legion's most prized possessions are its name, emblem and logo. Its century of existence has built an environment of respect around those three things. Protecting those prized possessions is necessary to ensure that the environment of respect remains in place.

The American Legion's work under the four pillars, particularly the work involving Americanism and Children and Youth, often involves outside organizations and almost always community partnerships. Protecting the three possessions requires that rules be put in place to ensure that protection continues.

Many programs exist to carry forward The American Legion's work. Some are strictly internal, such as Sons of the American Legion and Legion Riders, while others are more external, such as American Legion Baseball and Boys State. Regardless of whether they are internal or external, these programs must obey the same set of rules, even though in some cases, seemingly independent organizations are created to assist with the work of a particular program.

All programs, whether strictly internal or organized under a subsidiary corporation or entity, must obey the following four rules. Whether the program in question is chartered by a Post, a County or District, a Department or National as the parent organization, this requirement is in place.

If one or more of these rules is violated, National will need to enforce intellectual property rights against the organization that caused the violation.

**Rule #1** – "Leadership" – All elected and appointed leaders must be confirmed by the parent organization after each selection, or as needed.

**Rule #2** – "Rules" – All bylaws, amendments and/or standing rules must be presented to the parent organization for confirmation and approval prior to use.

**Rule #3** – "Reports" – The program will provide to the parent organization: (a) monthly activities reports; (b) quarterly financial reports; (c) an annual financial statement; and (d) any additional report(s) requested by the parent organization.

**Rule #4** – "Controls" – The parent organization may provide the program with the employer identification number (EIN) and the tax-exemption status, with the necessary financial controls over their usage. All program financial accounts must have a minimum of two (2) signatories appointed by the parent organization.

By signing the following statement, you acknowledge that you have read and understand the rules and will comply with those requirements. It is recommended that this form be signed by the program leader and a post officer annually or when there is a change in leadership.

**Title: Support for NATO Expansion Origin: National Security Commission** 

WHEREAS, The American Legion has long recognized that European security and preservation of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) is critical to America's vital national security interests; and

WHEREAS, The American Legion supports the essential role of NATO to maintain international order and the protection of nations' sovereignty; and

WHEREAS, The American Legion believes expanding NATO will: 1) strengthen collective defense; 2) stabilize and promote democratic values; and 3) support diverse, multi-ethnic communities and stand against ethnic conflicts; and

WHEREAS, NATO's Article 5 is a vital part of the alliance and should remain in effect, but the mutual defense clause does not apply to partner countries, many of which are potential candidates for NATO membership; and

WHEREAS, The accession of new members adds military capabilities but also political and economic challenges; and

WHEREAS, Future enlargement depends on geopolitical factors, including relations with Russia and the stability of potential candidate countries; and

WHEREAS, NATO enlargement is key to international security, but requires careful planning to maximize its advantages and minimize its negatives; and

WHEREAS, The initial wave of NATO expansion included the strategic inclusion of Poland, Hungary and the Czech Republic in 1999, which demonstrated Western countries' support for the democratic transition in Central Europe; and

**Title: Support for NATO Expansion Origin: National Security Commission** 

WHEREAS, The most recent expansion of NATO membership to Finland and Sweden in 2023 and 2024, respectively, demonstrates NATO's commitment to protecting its members and responding to new security threats, like increasing Russian aggression; and

WHEREAS, The membership also significantly increased NATO's ability to monitor and respond to activities in the Baltic Sea and the Arctic region; and

WHEREAS, Several NATO intelligence services note Russia is stockpiling weapons, expanding its overall force and upgrading and building military infrastructure near NATO's eastern frontier, while NATO's military capabilities, especially those of the European allies, do not match the growing threat the alliance faces; now, therefore, be it

Title: Medal of Honor for Michael Ollis

Origin: Resolution No. 35 (NY) 2025 National Convention

WHEREAS, United States Army Staff Sgt. Michael Ollis was killed in action while protecting his troops and shielding a Polish soldier from a suicide bomber on Aug. 28, 2013, in Ghazni province, Afghanistan; and

WHEREAS, Staff Sgt. Michael Ollis acted with utter fearlessness, intrepidity of the highest order and a willingness to sacrifice his own life so that his fellow soldiers on Forward Operating Base Ghazni could move to bunkers to shield themselves from fire; and

WHEREAS, During a massive attack that began when a car bomb breached the base's eastern perimeter wall and allowed ten insurgents in suicide bomber vests to infiltrate the compound; and

WHEREAS, After linking up with other friendlies Staff Sgt. Michael Ollis joined the fight to repulse the insurgents who had breached their defenses, all while under continuous small arms, indirect, and rocket-propelled grenade fire; and

WHEREAS, The selfless actions of Staff Sgt. Michael Ollis, by closing and engaging with the enemy at close range, diverted enemy fire away from the Task Force Copperhead compound; and

WHEREAS, This diversion provided a window of opportunity for forty-one civilian contractor personnel to egress West to a secure area away from the line of fire; and

WHEREAS, Staff Sergeant Michael Ollis' actions directly resulted in the lives of the contractor personnel being saved; and

WHEREAS, During the fight, an insurgent with a suicide bomber vest rounded a corner and began advancing on them while shooting; and

WHEREAS, Staff Sgt. Michael Ollis, without body armor, put himself between the insurgent and an allied Polish Army officer, Lt. Karol Cierpica, who had been wounded in both legs and was unable to walk; and

WHEREAS, CONUS veterans can receive post-traumatic stress disorder/traumatic brain injury counseling and peer support, yet these military competency and behavioral counseling supports are nonexistent for OCONUS veterans; and

Title: Oversight of Medical Disability Examination Office Contract Providers

Origin: Resolution No. 28 (DE) 2025 National Convention

WHEREAS Compensation and Pension (C&P) examinations are a vital part of the Department of Veterans Affairs' (VA) disability claims process, used by claims adjudicators in the Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA) to determine whether veterans' illnesses, injuries or conditions are connected to their active-duty military service; and

WHEREAS, VA has contracted vendors to perform the vast majority of C&P exams, representing expenditures of more than \$10.4 billion on these contracts from FY 2017 through FY23 and an additional estimated \$5 billion in FY24; and

WHEREAS, VA established the Medical Disability Examination Office (MDEO) in 2016 to manage contractors who perform disability exams for the VA; and

WHEREAS, In May 2024, VA's Office of Inspector General (OIG) reported deficiencies at 114 out of 135 VA-contracted examination facilities visited; and

WHEREAS. The MDEO relies on vendors to self-certify compliance with Americans with Disabilities Act and Occupational Safety and Health Administration standards and, according to OIG, "did not provide necessary oversight" of the vendor program, "despite receiving complaints from veterans"; and

WHEREAS, MDEO lacks independent access to VA-contracted facilities, relies on vendors to conduct their own surveys on patient satisfaction and lacks formal standardized procedures and training for the inspection of VA-contracted facilities; and

WHEREAS, The American Legion's service officers, accredited representatives and national staff have reported numerous problems with VA-contracted C&P exams, including poorly trained examiners, unqualified practitioners, questionable "medical facilities," inadequate medical opinions and disrespectful attitudes toward patients; and

WHEREAS, The Veterans Benefits Administration, in response to a report issued by the Government Accountability Office in September 2024, promised to complete a plan by January 31, 2025, to improve the quality of C&P Examinations; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, By the National Executive Committee of The American Legion in regular meeting assembled in Indianapolis, Indiana, October 8-9, 2025, That The American Legion urges Congress to increase its oversight of the Medical Disability Examination Office to ensure more efficient, cost-effective management of VA-contracted vendors that will substantially increase the quality of Compensation and Pension Examinations for America's veterans and dependents.

WHEREAS, Since FY 2017, the court has seen a 121% increase in the appeals it receives annually, with no foreseeable reduction in workload, given the substantial increase in claims submitted under provisions of the Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act; now, therefore, be it

Title: Opioid Treatment Research

Origin: Resolution No. 4 (MT) 2025 National Convention

WHEREAS, Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) research shows that pain, combat trauma, pain treatment and the often-challenging process of reintegration after military service are contributory factors in opioid dependence among veterans; and

WHEREAS, Pain medication used to treat combat-related injury, and the prevalence of over-prescribed opioids led to a 50% increase in overdose mortality among veteran populations between 2010-2019; and

WHEREAS, Post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) symptoms, physiological pain, interpersonal relationships and life events are synergistically producing behaviors that create a risk for overdose; and

WHEREAS, Several privately funded studies show treatment of opioid use disorder and co-occurring mental health disorders with ibogaine and 5MEO-DMT-assisted therapy with trauma-exposed special operations force veterans; and

WHEREAS, The VA reported about 11-20% of veterans who served in Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom have PTSD in a given year; and about 12% of Gulf War (Desert Storm) veterans have PTSD in a given year; and about 30% of Vietnam veterans have had PTSD in their lifetime; and

WHEREAS, The VA's most recent study in 2020 shows that over 125,000 have committed suicide since the Global War on Terror started in 2001, and that psychedelics have the potential to reduce that rate; and

WHEREAS, Further research in a controlled setting to study ibogaine and 5MEO-DMT is desperately needed and the State of Texas has recently agreed to provide \$50 million towards that effort; and

WHEREAS, MDMA and psilocybin were recently granted the FDA's coveted "breakthrough therapy designation" for the treatment of PTSD and treatment resistant depression and major depressive disorder, respectively, representing a significant improvement over currently available interventions for the treatment of PTSD and depression; and

WHEREAS, Phase 3 clinical trials of MDMA-assisted therapy have found that two-thirds of participants with severe PTSD have experienced complete remission and one-third an 87% reduction in symptoms; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, By the National Executive Committee of The American Legion in regular meeting assembled in Indianapolis, Indiana, on October 8-9, 2025, That The American Legion urges the National Association of Attorneys General to support the use of opioid abatement funds to further research on the safety and efficacy of emerging therapies, which should include psilocybin, ibogaine root, lysergic acid diethylamide, 5MeO-DMT, cannabis and MDMA to treat opioid use disorder & other addictions, post-traumatic stress disorder, traumatic brain injury, and pain management in veterans and their partners.

Title: Expand the Presumptive Period for Veterans Who Served on the Korean Demilitarized Zone Origin: Resolution No. 9 (MN) 2025 National Convention

WHEREAS, The United States Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) recognizes that veterans who served in certain areas of the Republic of Vietnam during the Vietnam War are presumed to have been exposed to Agent Orange and other herbicides, which has led to various health problems; and

WHEREAS, Agent Orange was used extensively on the Korean Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) to clear vegetation and reduce concealment for enemy forces during the period of April 1, 1968, to August 31, 1971; and

WHEREAS, Many veterans who served on the Korean DMZ during the above-mentioned period were exposed to Agent Orange and other toxic herbicides, but their service has been excluded from the VA's presumptive exposure list; and

WHEREAS, The VA has recognized soil contamination from Agent Orange on the Korean DMZ, and some veterans who served after 1971 are suffering from conditions associated with Agent Orange exposure, yet they remain ineligible for benefits due to the VA's limited presumptive service connection timeline; and

WHEREAS, There is growing evidence that soil contamination from Agent Orange remained in the DMZ area for many years after the last known use of the herbicide, potentially affecting veterans who served beyond August 31, 1971; and

WHEREAS, Veterans who served in the DMZ up to August 31, 2001, may have been unknowingly exposed to toxic herbicides due to residual contamination from Agent Orange, putting them at risk for the same health conditions as those veterans who served within the original presumptive period; and

WHEREAS, These veterans and their families deserve recognition, support, and access to appropriate medical care and benefits for the health effects caused by Agent Orange exposure; and

WHEREAS, The American Legion has long been a vocal advocate for fair treatment of all veterans, ensuring they receive the benefits and recognition they deserve for their service and sacrifices; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, by the National Executive Committee of The American Legion in regular meeting assembled in Indianapolis, Indiana, on October 8-9, 2025, That The American Legion urges the United States Congress and the Department of Veterans Affairs to expand the presumptive exposure for veterans who served on the Korean DMZ to include those who served until August 31, 2001, due to the ongoing risk of exposure to soil contamination from Agent Orange; and, be it finally

RESOLVED, That The American Legion calls for appropriate funding and research to assess the impact of Agent Orange exposure on veterans who served in this region and to provide them with the medical care, benefits and recognition they are entitled to under the law.

WHEREAS, The American Legion is a national veterans service organization dedicated to honoring the service of current and former servicemembers and providing ongoing support to their surviving families; and

WHEREAS, The American Legion has long been at the forefront of advocacy for veterans exposed to environmental hazards such as Agent Orange, Gulf War-related hazards, ionizing radiation and the various chemicals and agents used during Project Shipboard Hazard and Defense; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Defense's (DoD) disclosure of information regarding various potential hazardous exposures and the current advancement of scientific research continues to reveal new potential environmental threats to servicemembers; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Veterans Affairs was congressionally mandated by Public Law 102-4 (1991) to contract with the National Academy of Sciences to review existing peer-reviewed research on herbicides, to include their components, exposure and medical evidence on related health effects; and

WHEREAS, In the last several years new concerns have been raised regarding contamination of stateside and international military installations and locations such as, but not limited to: groundwater contamination at Camp Lejeune, NC; environmental contaminants at Gagetown, New Brunswick located in Canada; Fort Drum, NY; Fort Dugway, UT; post-hostility Vietnam; and Fort McClellan, AL; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Veterans Affairs was congressionally mandated by Public Law 112-154 to provide health care to family members of veterans stationed at Camp Lejeune who became ill due to environmental exposures at the base; and

WHEREAS, Major overseas situations regarding exposures such as sodium dichromate in a water treatment facility in Qarmat Ali, Iraq, toxic exposures at the Naval Air Facility in Atsugi, Japan, dioxins and other contaminants at Johnston Atoll, and others; and

WHEREAS, On October 31, 2011, the Institute of Medicine released a report on the long-term health consequences from exposure to burn pits in Iraq and Afghanistan, and currently determined that there is insufficient evidence at this point, but recommended further longitudinal studies over time to determine incidences of chronic diseases; and

WHEREAS, H.R.3967, Honoring our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act of 2022, passed Congress ushering in a modern presumption decision process; and

Title: Comprehensive End-of-Life Supports for Veterans' Survivors

Origin: Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation Commission

WHEREAS, The American Legion is a national veterans service organization dedicated to honoring the service of current and former servicemembers and providing ongoing support to their surviving families; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Defense (DoD) Casualty Assistance Program fields DoD Casualty Assistance Calls Officers who provide personalized one-on-one supportive services for survivors of servicemembers who die while on active duty; and

WHEREAS, These robust survivor supports do not exist for veterans who decease, and their surviving spouses or next-of kin family members must secure a death certificate, a DD214, separation documents and bereavement support without assistance; and

WHEREAS, The federally mandated VA Veterans' Family, Caregiver and Survivor Advisory Committee recommended in June 2024 the timely creation of the Survivor Assistance and Memorial Support program to provide survivors with in-person access to dedicated decedent staff within VA facilities for personalized and supportive services at the end of a veteran's life including: selecting a funeral home, requesting an autopsy, death certificate, bereavement support and acquiring other death benefits (such as: Survivors' and Dependents' Education Assistant Program under Chapter 35, VA Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC), VA Survivors Pension, VA home loan guarantee or VA Aid and Attendance benefits); and

WHEREAS, By May 2025, the VA Office of Survivors Assistance created a "white glove" survivor's outreach team located at the Philadelphia Regional Benefits Office to better assist survivors in the navigation of the benefits process for DIC claims; yet by mid-July, VA still had 18,441 initial DIC claims, with 39.1% (or 7,203) still pending over 125 days and 246,689 DIC award adjustment claims, with 33.3% (or 82,141 cases) pending over 125 days; and

WHEREAS, Even after the COVID-19 pandemic, families still reported experiencing weeks of delay for the VA to sign off on a loved one's death certificate for "natural causes" which, to the family's chagrin, delayed further burial plans and the release of entitled survivor benefits; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, By the National Executive Committee of The American Legion in regular meeting assembled in Indianapolis, Indiana, on October 8-9, 2025, That The American Legion supports any legislation calling for the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to be sufficiently staffed and carry out comprehensive end-of-life survivor programs and supports ways to facilitate and ease the administrative barriers faced by bereaved survivors when filing for VA claims and benefits; and, be it finally

RESOLVED, That The American Legion urges the VA to proactively provide or connect surviving families of veterans who die from a service-connected condition, or while receiving care for such conditions, with bereavement counseling, peer supports and any other appropriate resources concerning decedent affairs.

Title: Ensuring Parity for Survivor Dependency and Indemnity Compensation

Origin: Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation Commission

WHEREAS, The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) established the Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC) benefit in 1993 for the eligible spouse, child or parent of a servicemember who died in the line of duty or for a survivor of a veteran who died from a service-related injury or illness or who had a rating of totally disabled for at least 10 years prior to their death; and

WHEREAS, Stringent rules apply, such as requiring the veteran to be VA-rated at 100% total disability for 10 consecutive years for the survivor to qualify for DIC; and

WHEREAS, Other rules exist such as requiring the veteran to be VA-rated at 100% total for eight years prior to death to qualify for the enhanced monthly DIC "kicker" payments authorized under 38 U.S. Code § 1311 (a)(2); and

WHEREAS, The above-mentioned requirement is unfair for people living with Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis, as their life expectancy is much shorter, ranging from 2-5 years; and

WHEREAS, Other inequalities exist in VA's current program when VA's monthly DIC rate only provides 43% (or \$1,653) of a single 100% disabled veteran's compensation, compared to 55% (\$2,107) when a former spouse of a federal employee or retiree files for Basic Employee Death Benefit under the Federal Employees Retirement System; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, By the National Executive Committee of The American Legion in regular meeting assembled in Indianapolis, Indiana, on October 8-9, 2025, That The American Legion urges Congress and the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to review and/or amend its current eligibility criteria for Dependency and Indemnity Compensation, including supplemental payments, to provide equitable access to earned benefits; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That Congress seeks parity between VA survivors' programs and other federal survivors' programs, to ensure survivors may obtain the same level of support and benefits enjoyed by other federal services; and, be it finally

WHEREAS, The American Legion has been a forceful advocate for accountability at the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) when employees defraud the system, hurt veterans or engage in other wrongdoing detrimental to veterans or their health care; and

WHEREAS, The vast majority of VA employees who do not engage in illegal or unethical conduct can be victims of institutional reputation loss by the minority who do; and

WHEREAS, Federal courts have gutted key provisions of the 2017 Accountability Act, such as measures that expedited punishment and removal of employees who engage in wrongdoing and removing more reasonable evidentiary requirements for employee misconduct that the bill established; now, therefore, be it

Title: Improving Department of Veterans Affairs Fiduciary Oversight and Protections

Origin: Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation Commission

Willie While

WHEREAS, Devised in 1985, The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Fiduciary Program was established to protect veterans and other beneficiaries who are unable to manage their financial affairs due to injury, disease and age; and

WHEREAS, VA only determines an individual to be unable to manage their financial affairs after receipt of medical documentation or if a court of competent jurisdiction has already made the determination; and

WHEREAS, Veterans/survivors deemed unable to manage their VA benefits may be assigned a VA-fiduciary to be responsible for accepting and ensuring that VA benefits are used to support the intended beneficiary; and

WHEREAS, A 2010 VA Office of Inspector General (VA OIG) audit of the Fiduciary Program's effectiveness in addressing potential misuse of beneficiary funds identified the Veterans Benefits Administration's failure to examine financial reports, as well as failure to timely respond to misuse allegations in 96% of the cases reviewed; and

WHEREAS, A 2015 VA OIG audit of Fiduciary Program's management of field examinations found that VBA staff did not meet timeliness standards for about 42% of approximately 109,000 pending and completed field examinations during calendar year 2013; and

WHEREAS, A 2021 VA OIG report noted more than 170,000 VA-assigned fiduciaries with 12,000 allegations of fraud made from January 2018 to September 2019, and there existed significant reimbursement wait periods where beneficiaries waited an average of 468 days for VA to make a negligence determination or 228 days to make a misuse determination before the victim of fraud could recoup lost monies; and

WHEREAS, The VA OIG estimated that these untimely field examinations placed ~\$360.7 million in benefit payments and ~\$487.6 million in estate values at increased risk; and

WHEREAS, VA's current Fiduciary Program has been found inadequate in its protection of benefits provided to veterans or designated beneficiaries; now, therefore, be it

### Finance Commission Report to the National Executive Committee October 8, 2025

The Finance Commission met Monday and Tuesday, October 6-7. All commission members were present.

Also present were: Rodney Rolland, National Adjutant; Mark Seavey, National Judge Advocate; and Robert Skinner, Jeremy Ehart, Leslie Clevinger and Glen Sharbono of the Finance Commission NEC Liaison Committee.

Several guests and staff members joined us throughout the course of the meeting.

Authorized national headquarters staff head count remains at 257.

Our IT Director reported to us that the new Customer Relationship Management (CRM) System is under budget and on schedule to be completed by December 31, 2026.

Other activities by your Finance Commission at this meeting include:

- Approved \$95,100 in 2026 capital expenditures.
- Approved the employment of certified public accountants Crowe LLP to prepare The American Legion's 2025 fiscal year audit and tax returns.
- Recommended that 2027 dues be allocated as follows: \$3 to The American Legion
   Magazine and \$20.50 to the general fund.

- Named NFP as agent-of-record for The American Legion employee health and life insurance and risk liability insurance programs for the 2026 year.
- Approved renewal of line of credit. This is a \$2,000,000 line with a \$3,000,000 accordion option for a total available line of credit of \$5,000,000.
- Approved The American Legion's investment policy for 2026.
- Approved a 1.5% COLA for national headquarters graded employees effective January 1, 2026.
- Approved \$1,108 in Magazine manuscript write-offs.

We are projecting that we will end 2025 with a surplus of \$4,289,386, and we are requesting approval of a budget for 2026 which has \$76,608,066 in expense and \$76,608,066 in income, for a balanced budget.

Pursuant to Resolution 2, NEC May 2023, The American Legion will recoup the monies paid on behalf of the Department of Colorado while its charter was under suspension.

Resolutions recommended for your approval are provided.

# REPORT OF NATIONAL SECURITY COMMISSION TO THE NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

#### October 8-9, 2025

Following a successful 106th National Convention, the National Security Commission continued to work on several resolutions, engaged in advocacy efforts to prevent a government shutdown that would halt military payments, and continued its efforts to include bill text in the final Fiscal Year 2026 National Defense Authorization Act.

### National Security Resolution Screening Committee

The National Security Resolution Screening Committee meeting convened at 5:30 p.m. on September 23, 2025, supported by national staff and attended by the following:

On September 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2025, the National Security Resolution Screening Committee convened to deliberate on Resolution No. 5: National Defense Budget Review, Resolution No. 21: Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal for service in Honduras, Resolution No. 35: Medal of Honor for Michael Ollis, Registered Resolution No. 2863: Merit-Based Criteria for Military Personnel Decisions, Registered Resolution No. 2868: Selective Service for Woman, , and Resolution No.: Support for NATO Expansion. ### American Legion Media & Communications Commission Report to the National Executive Committee Oct. 8, 2025

The American Legion Media & Communications Commission oversees multiple top national priorities, largely through promotion and information for members and others, including:

- Veteran suicide prevention through the Be the One mission
- Membership enhancement by developing creative resources and promotions, as well member-engagement activities like the USA 250 Challenge, and membership success stories
- Corporate financial stability through the publication and dissemination of revenuegenerating arms of The American Legion, such as corporate partnerships, planned giving, Emblem Sales merchandising and mitigation of U.S. Postal Service cost increases
- Talent management by enhanced coordination with staff in alignment with other divisions, emphatically Marketing

The Media & Communications team operates in many arenas beyond The *American Legion Magazine*, the e-newsletter program, social media, podcast, website, mobile apps, the convention guide and annual report. Media & Communications resources and skill sets are also applied to a variety of needs, from flag education scripts to convention speeches, promotional videos and logbooks to brochures, documents, officer guides, posters and external media message points and responses.

Media & Communications staff and resources have also been – and are always – applied to help plan, execute and support such efforts as the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of American Legion Baseball, the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the United States, American Legion associate sponsorship of the Army-Navy Game, Operation Metrics to better report impact numbers for The American Legion and more.

The Media & Communications Commission oversees most messaging platforms to internal audiences of the national organization and, in the interim, external media outreach and response. Following is a snapshot of some of the primary responsibilities of the commission and the staff it oversees, as well as current status:

- The American Legion Magazine. Ranked first in male readership loyalty among all U.S. periodicals, according to independent research, the magazine is the flagship of the commission. The sea upon which that flagship sails, however, is unpredictable and often turbulent. Key developments for the magazine in 2025 include:

- o Cost savings in paper and printing, putting the magazine a combined \$183,625 under budget in those areas.
- o A 12% increase in postage cost imposed in July, following annual increases of 9% or greater in previous years, putting the magazine \$275,670 over budget on postage.
- Outside ad sales of more than \$4.4 million through the November issue, which is just over \$1 million under budget, plus \$2.47 million in ad placements for corporate partners under the national Marketing Commission.
- The bottom line through the August issue (most current available) is that the magazine stands at \$92,045 off budget – after ad revenues, marketing revenues, print and paper cost reductions and postage increases are factored.
- o The American Legion Magazine continues to uphold the highest values of the organization, examining a range of national topics connected to the four pillars of the organization while simultaneously driving forward such national initiatives as the Be the One mission, the centennial of American Legion Baseball, the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the nation, key legislative priorities and resolution-driven interests of the organization.
- O As consumer use of printed media continues to change and give way to digital media, the commission supports strategic planning for a new future of *The American Legion Magazine*, and the first of such brainstorming sessions has been conducted and will be scheduled on a consistent basis for the foreseeable future.
- **E-newsletter program.** Audience open rates for e-newsletters produced and distributed under Media & Communications have rocketed in 2025. The average open rate has risen from 18.37% in 2021 to 28.63% in 2025. The e-newsletter audience has also grown in number from about 861,000 in 2021 to 1.04 million in 2025. E-newsletter advertising now stands at \$107,480 to date, already \$32,483 ahead of budget for the entire year.
- Legion.org. Management and administration of the national American Legion
  website moved into the Marketing Division in September 2024, but Media &
  Communications staff continue to support it by producing and posting news stories,
  photos and videos; and providing design assistance, as requested or needed. Media
  & Communications also handles most outside advertising on legion.org, which

stood at \$57,044 through September, well above the year-end budget of \$22,500. Media & Communications also manages the legiontown.org web platform, where local posts and members can share their stories and photos by category.

- Thank You Thursday. This e-mail program for advertisers and corporate allies launched in early 2025 and so far has generated \$240,000 in revenue, largely through sales made by the James G. Elliott Co., which has long been a contracted vendor of the Media & Communications Commission. It is now on pace to nearly reach \$400,000 in revenue.
- Tango Alpha Lima. The nationally recognized Tango Alpha Lima podcast addresses topics relevant mainly to the post-9/11 generation of veterans (hosted by post-9/11 veterans) but has sustained a decline in monthly downloads since its 2023 highs. Those higher audience numbers were driven significantly by host and social media influencer Ashley Gutermuth. Since its 2020 debut, Tango Alpha Lima has been downloaded 376,792 times on various platforms, primarily Apple Podcast. The podcast also appears on YouTube, where it has been viewed 121,400 times. Tango Alpha Lima recently moved to Spotify as its primary host and in two weeks there has had another 4,914 views. On Oct. 2, 2025, the Media & Communications team launched "Welcome Home: The Global War on Terrorism Memorial Podcast" on a production contract that adds a revenue stream for the division. Furthermore, Tango Alpha Lima is attracting well-known guests, such as famed documentary filmmaker Ken Burns, country musician Scott Hasting and NFL Insider/Fox Sports broadcaster Jay Glazer.
- **Digital Dispatch:** With a subscriber base of nearly 30,000 twice a month, the Digital Dispatch continues to deliver information and news for American Legion leadership audiences and enjoys an extremely high open rate of about 34%.
- **Social media.** All American Legion social media platforms are continuously gaining followers. As of Oct. 1, the national American Legion Facebook following stood at 190,193. The X following was at 121,276. The national American Legion LinkedIn follower count was 54,178, and the national Instagram audience has grown to 38,919. All of these channels have had consistent and continuous growth.
- **Mobile apps.** The Media & Communications team produces and updates a family of three American Legion national mobile apps, which have largely seasonal

#### audiences:

- National Convention: 8,428 devices downloaded as of Sept. 1, 2025
- American Legion World Series: 19,771 downloaded
- Sons of The American Legion: 12,488 downloaded
- Annual/occasional print media: The Media & Communications group produces or assists in production of most annual printed media, including the Convention Guide, Annual Report, Positions & Programs, Legislative Agenda, Officers Guides, program brochures, rulebooks and more. The Media & Communications team also writes, edits and produces "one-off" publications like "A Century of Citizenship Through Sportsmanship" bookazine on the centennial of American Legion Baseball, "Whole Child" on the Legion's Children & Youth programs, the Boys Nation Yearbook, toolkits and resources to support certain programs and initiatives like Buddy Checks, as well as stand-alone products like "Measurable Impact," a graphically designed assembly of performance metrics for the organization, for print or download, now in use in department membership campaigns.
- Physical displays: Media & Communications also designs and produces physical media for the national organization, including booths, plaques, truck wraps and pop-ups. Among those in 2025 have been a front-window display in support of America250's Two Lights On for Tomorrow effort in April to celebrate the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Paul Revere's famous ride, as well as pop-up display panels on the history of American Legion Baseball, for the program's centennial. Media & Communications is also responsible for official portraits of national officers, to include framing and presentation.
- **External media:** In addition to media produced largely for internal membership audiences, Media & Communications resumed external media relations support two years ago, on an interim basis until a long-term solution is achieved. This includes press release writing and distribution, pitching national leadership to media outlets on important stories and external media query response.
- **Logbooks:** Media & Communications Division Executive Speechwriter John Raughter has the difficult and important job of drafting, updating and managing the "run-of-show" logbooks for the national convention, Washington Conference, Spring and Fall Meetings, as well as other events.

- Awards: Media & Communications manages no fewer than two major national awards each year, the Fourth Estate Award and the James V. Day "Good Guy" Award, and provides support in many ways for the Patriot Award, Distinguished Service Medal and others.

The Media & Communications Commission understands the evolving nature of the business of messaging and is guiding American Legion staff to address changes, make adjustments where needed, and stand prepared for more unpredictable shifts in the way Americans engage media.

### Report: Convention Commission October 6, 2025 Michael E. Walton (IL), Chairman

Chairman Michael E. Walton, Illinois, called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m., Monday, October 6, 2025. Roll call was taken with all members either excused or present.

Chief Judge David Priester spoke to the Convention Commission regarding the National Color Guard Contests, which were held Friday of convention. The Color Guard contests were well attended by contestants and observers. Six (6) color guards competed in four categories with Lady Lake Post 347, Lady Lake, Florida, being awarded the National Commander Color Guard. The JROTC competition class had twenty-four units competing with West Caldwell taking first place in what was another impressive display. There was no band contest this year.

Convention Commission members reported on their assignments during the 2025 National Convention. Reports indicated the local Convention Corporation conducted their duties in outstanding fashion and greatly contributed to the overall success of the National Convention. Chairman Walton and Commission members thanked PNC Clarence Hill, President, American Legion National Convention Corporation of Florida, and his entire Florida team for their support to make the Tampa convention a success. Chairman Walton also thanked the Convention Division staff on the entire convention.

President of the 2025, PNC Clarence Hill, President, American Legion National Convention Corporation of Florida gave his report. PNC Hill thanked the Convention Commission for their support and reported, in his opinion, the 2025 National Convention was a huge success. PNC Hill will provide a final report at the 2026 Spring Meetings. Chairman Walton thanked PNC Hill and his approximately 50 volunteers for conducting the 2025 National Convention.

Chairman Walton gave a report on the planning process for the 2026, 107<sup>th</sup> National Convention in Louisville, Kentucky, August 28 – September 3, 2026. Planning for the 107<sup>th</sup> National Convention of The American Legion is on schedule. Headquarters hotel for the Legion, Auxiliary, Sons of The American Legion and FODPAL will be at the Galt House. ### REPORT OF THE THE AMERICAN LEGION AMERICANISM COMMISSSION MARK A. AVIS (MA), CHAIRMAN OCTOBER 6-7, 2025

The Americanism Commission met at the Sheraton Hotel City Centre in Indianapolis, Indiana, on Monday and Tuesday, October 6 - 7, 2025. The meeting convened at 8:30 a.m. each day and roll call taken. Americanism Commission members answering the roll were: Chairman Mark A. Avis (MA); Vice Chairman Michael Donnelly (NC); Steve Colcord (IA); Randy Goodman (GA); Herbert Petit Jr. (LA); Scott Paradis (ME); James Watson (TX); Betty Sevenson (AL); Lyman Brenner (DE); Sandra Crosno (ID); Gerald Theriot (LA); Francis Riter (NY); Lewis Jones (PA); Patricia Dandy (SC); Randy Edwards (UT); Steven Hayes (CO); and Loren Sperry (WA). Including members of the Americanism Commission and guests, there were 73 in attendance.

The Commission was honored to receive remarks from The American Legion National Commander, Dan Wiley (KS) and Sons of The American Legion National Commander, William Clancy III (NY). The Commission was further honored by remarks from Past National Commander Daniel Dellinger (VA), as well as attendance by PNC's John "Jake" Comer (MA), David Rehbein (IA), Daniel Ludwig (MN), Thomas Bock (CO), Charles Schmidt (OR), James LaCoursiere (CT) and Anthony Jordan (ME).

Sons of The American Legion National Americanism chairman Jeffrey Hicks (NJ) brought greetings and presented on the Sons of The American Legion efforts to support American Legion Youth Programs.

Following opening remarks and introduction of distinguished guests, the Digest of Proceedings from the 2025 Spring commission meeting, and the report of the 2025 pre-national convention Americanism Commission meeting were each received and filed.

The Commission recessed on Tuesday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, at 10:25am after receiving reports from the National Americanism Conference sessions conducted on September 26<sup>th</sup>-28<sup>th</sup>, The Committee on Youth Education meetings conducted on October 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup>, and the joint session of the Committee on Children & Youth and Youth Cadet Law Enforcement Committee conducted on Monday, October 6<sup>th</sup>. A summary of the reports received by the Commission are provided below.

### AMERICANISM COMMISSION EFFORTS TO SUPPORT THE 21<sup>ST</sup> CENTURY AD HOC COMMITTEE REPORT TO THE NEC, OCTOBER 2019

While Americanism, Children & Youth programs are not directly referenced in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Ad Hoc Committee's report to the NEC, they are implied as critical elements to the committee's emphasis on "Legacy and Vision." Reference is made to The American Legion's focus on strengthening America as a "common thread that most organizations cannot replicate." The continued service of Legionnaires to all Americans, not just veterans, is most clearly displayed in The American Legion's dedication to shaping and educating the youth of America and the continued promotion of confidence in our representative democracy.

In 2025, the Americanism Commission continued its focus on marketing the value of The American Legion's Youth Program to an external audience to include: academia, donors,

civil society organizations, and American families. Improvements in the programs, specifically with Hillsdale College hosting the National Oratorical Competition and Junior Shooting Sports competition for the second year, and Boys Nation having an audience with the Secretary of War in the Pentagon, helped to gain significant citizen awareness of The American Legion's programs. The social media activity of all youth programs in 2025 were at record high, and the addition of the Centennial Classic baseball tournament, celebrating 100-years of American Legion Baseball, received widespread attention and praise. The additional emphasis on America's 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of independence helped to firm up relationships with civil society built over the last few years. Chairman Avis used every opportunity to encourage members of the Americanism Commission and Council, as well as Department leadership, to find a seat on their state 250 commissions to ensure a physical presence of Legionnaires at every state function celebrating America in 2026.

### COMMITTEE ON YOUTH EDUCATION GEORGE POGGE (KS) INTERIM CHAIRMAN OCTOBER 4-5, 2025

The Committee on Youth Education (COYE) met on Saturday October 4, 2025, in Panorama Rm B and then on Sunday, October 5, 2025, in the Library Rm on the 21st floor of the Sheraton Circle Centre Hotel in Indianapolis, Indiana. The meeting was convened at 9 am. Interim Chairman George Pogge (KS) called the meeting to order with the hand salute to our colors. Barbara Washburn (NE) led the meeting in the Pledge of Allegiance. Jim Davis (WV) led the POW/MIA Remembrance. Interim Chairman Pogge (KS) offered up the invocation and led the Preamble of our Constitution.

Stacy Cope, Youth Welfare Program Manager, conducted a roll call; a quorum was present. The following members were in attendance. George Pogge (KS), Interim Chairman, Jim Davis (WV), Vice-Chairman, Hugh Holmes (SD), Tom Marciciak (IL), Jean Williams (NY), Michael Donnelly (NC), and Randy Goodman (GA). American Legion Auxiliary consultants were also present: Barbara Washburn (NE), Judy Ackerman (MN), and Nancy Babis (NY).

The following guests were in attendance and brought greetings: Mark Avis (MA), National Americanism Chairman, The American Legion; Ron Neff (IN), Americanism Director, The American Legion; Lyman Brenner (DE), Kirk Williams (AR); Laura Arand, Program Manager, American Legion Auxiliary; and Stacy Cope, Youth Welfare Program Manager.

Interim Chairman Pogge (KS) brought greetings to the meeting and asked everyone to introduce themselves to the group.

The committee reviewed the minutes of the 2025 Spring Meeting. Jean Williams (NY) made a motion to approve the report. Tom Marciciak (IL) seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Barbara Washburn (NE) provided a brief report on Education program within the American Legion Auxiliary.

Ron Neff (IN) briefed the committee on the Samsung Scholarship Policy Guide changes. At this time, there are no policy guide changes due to the vacant Youth Education Program Manager position.

Stacy Cope provided the committee with the 2025 Samsung American Legion National Scholars and Runners Up for the committee's review and discussion. A robust discussion took place on how each person grades and ranks applicants, including ones from their own

department. Staff will verify whether or not scores for an applicant are dropped if the grader is from the same department with the system administrator. Jean Williams (NY) made a motion to amend Appendix C of the Samsung SOP to allow all graders to review, grade, and rank all applicants from every department. Jim Davis (WV) seconded the motion. The motion passed. Jim Davis (WV) made a motion to accept the Samsung Scholar Winners and Runners-Up recommendations as they have been presented. Hugh Holmes (SD) seconded the motion. The motion passed. **Enclosure A** 

A discussion was held regarding the growing use of AI in the essay section of the application. The idea of implementing a point system based on the percentage of AI used in the essays was considered. However, the discussion was postponed so that staff could research resources to assist graders in determining the extent of AI usage in the essay portions of the application.

The committee reviewed and discussed ideas on potential essay questions for next year's Samsung application. The committee unanimously approved the following questions.

Question 1: Share a memory or incident from your qualifying veteran and what impact it has had on your life.

**Question 2:** In celebration of our nation's 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. Which of the signers of the Declaration of Independence would you like to sit down with, and what would you like to ask them?

Michael Donnelly (NC) made a motion to allow staff to amend the wording, provided it does not alter their intent. Tom Marciciak (IL) seconded the motion. The motion passed.

The committee reopened discussion on the possibility of awarding reduced points to those descendants of qualifying veterans who have served in Korea but after the Korean War era (1951-1953). After a brief discussion, staff will need to review the governing trust documents to determine if such a change is allowed under the terms in the trust before making any changes to the SOP.

The committee has requested that staff reinstitute the monthly Microsoft Teams meeting, starting in November. The meeting will take place on the third Tuesday of every month at 12:00 pm EST. Staff will be responsible for compiling the agenda and minutes from the meeting. The first meeting will take place on November 18, 2025, and then on December 16, 2025.

With no other business for the day, Jim Davis (WV) made a motion to recess the meeting until 9:00 am tomorrow in the Library Room, on the 21st floor of the Sheraton Circle Centre Hotel. Hugh Holmes seconded the motion. The motion passed.

The Committee on Youth Education reconvened on Sunday at 9:00 am in the Library Room.

The committee reviewed the recommendations for the Education Certificate. Jean Williams (NY) made a motion to accept and approve 34 people from 15 departments for the Education Certificate. Jim Davis (WV) seconded the motion. The motion passed. The certificates will be mailed to the departments for their dissemination.

The Education Certificate under the purview of the Americanism Commission. Further discussions will take place regarding the criteria and submission process during the Teams meeting in the coming months.

Jim Davis (WV) reviewed the criteria for submitting a name for consideration for the Educator of the Year Award before opening the floor for recommendations. Randy Goodman (GA) offered the Center for Constitutional Studies at Utah Valley University, a previous recommendation. Jim Davis (WV) recommended Motts Military Museum from Groveport,

Ohio, for the year 2027. The committee was asked to submit any suggestions to staff so that they can be discussed during the monthly Teams meeting.

Ron Neff (IN) provided an update on civics engagement. The Jack Miller Institute is committed to engaging civics in the classroom. The American Legion is excited to have two expert consultants on the Committee on Youth Education who will help further engage civics in the classroom.

In celebration of our nation's 250th, the American Legion is putting together educational toolkits for school-aged kids. The kit includes copies of the three comic books (Our Country's Veterans, Pledge of Allegiance, and Our Country's Flag), a 3 x 5 flag, handheld flags, and a script teaching youth about the flag and how to fold it and present it.

American Education Week will be held from November 17 to 21, 2025. We encourage posts and departments to celebrate those impacting youth through Education. This is an excellent opportunity to promote the School Awards program in your local schools.

With no other business coming before the committee, the meeting adjourned at 10:39 am.

# JOINT MEETING OF THE YOUTH CADET LAW ENFORCEMENT COMMITTEE AND THE COMMITTEE ON CHILDREN AND YOUTH HERBERT J. PETIT, JR. (LA), CHAIRMAN OCTOBER 6, 2025

The Joint Meeting of the Youth Cadet Law Enforcement Committee and Committee on Children and Youth met Monday, October 6, 2025, in the Michigan Room, 21<sup>st</sup> floor of the Sheraton Indianapolis Circle Centre Hotel in Indianapolis, Indiana. The meeting was convened at 9:55 a.m. EDT. Chairman Petit led the meeting in the Pledge of Allegiance, and POW/MIA remembrance. Peggy Moon (MN) led the invocation. Roll calls were taken with ten members in attendance, and a quorum declared. Committee on Children & Youth Chairman Herbert Petit, Jr., brought greetings and thanked the committee for the commitment to the children of this nation.

The following special guests were also in attendance and brought greetings and remarks before the Committee on Children and Youth: Dan Wiley (KS) National Commander, The American Legion, Jeff Trout (IL), Chairman, Sons of The American Legion's Committee on Children & Youth; Mark Nave (PA), Chairman, Sons of The American Legion Child Wellbeing Foundation Liaison; and Jeff Bennett Youth Activities Program Manager.

### American Legion Child Well-being Foundation (CWF)

Created by The American Legion in 1954, the American Legion Child Welfare Foundation, Inc. (CWF) now doing business as the American Legion Child Well-being Foundation, is a separate 501(c)3 corporation. Its philanthropic priority is to contribute to the physical, mental, spiritual and emotional welfare of children and youth by aiding progress in the field of child welfare through research, studies, surveys, projects or by supporting programs and activities benefitting the welfare of children and youth. From 1955 to date, the American Legion Child Welfare Foundation, Inc., has awarded more than \$21 million to organizations to assist children of this country.

Dennis Boland (FL), President of the American Legion Child Well-Being Foundation, provided a brief update to the Committee on Children and Youth. The CWF Board of Directors has approved nine grants totaling \$851,542 for the 2026 calendar year. President Boland discussed various ways to support CWF at your post, unit, and squadron through the CWF

100% Per Capita Banner program and memorial donations. Additionally, CWF is revitalizing the Children's Action Team (CAT). CAT members work within their departments or detachments to promote awareness and increase CWF donations.

### Youth Cadet Law Enforcement (YCLE) Update

Jeff Bennett, Youth Activities Program Manager, reported on the 22 YCLE programs across the United States, and the importance of why each department should have a YCLE program. Any department looking to start a YCLE program can contact a committee member, or the National Headquarters or a department that currently has a program for information, videos, and tools.

### Temporary Financial Assistance (TFA) Program Update

For this current calendar year through September 18<sup>th</sup>, 34,251, TFA grants have been provided to qualified veterans with minor children in the home to help with the basic needs of their child(ren). This is an increase over the TFA totals last year at this time.

The Committee on Children & Youth will conduct its biennial review of the Temporary Financial Assistance Program Policy and Procedures as required by Resolution 14 (Spring 2025) titled Temporary Financial Assistance Policy Program Update. Members are encouraged to review the policy and procedures and bring their questions to the Committee on Children & Youth in May 2026.

### Children & Youth Resolutions

Over the summer, the Committee on Children & Youth tasked with reviewing all 34 active resolutions relating to the health and safety of our nation's children & youth, did so. This task was to ensure all active resolutions remain relevant today. The committee held discussions on several of the resolutions, notably the duplication of a resolution. Committee members will continue to review the resolutions over the winter months, with any formal recommendations made to the Americanism Commission at the Spring Meetings.

With no other business before the Committee on Children & Youth, the committee stood in recess at 10:50 a.m.

### AMERICAN LEGION BASEBALL DIRECTOR'S CONFERENCE 65th ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF DEPARTMENT BASEBALL CHAIRMEN Lewis Jones (PA)

The 65th Annual Conference of Department Baseball Chairmen was held September 27-28, 2025, in-person at The American Legion National Headquarters, Indianapolis, Indiana as a program segment of the annual national Combined Americanism Conference. Gary Stone (MO), Chairman, American Legion Baseball Committee (ALB), served as the conference chairman. Twenty-six departments were represented by either their baseball program chairperson or designee.

Chairman Stone opened the Saturday morning's session. The invocation was given by ALB committee member, John DuVall (NC). American Legion Baseball Program Manager Steve Cloud (IN) extended welcome and greetings to the conference attendees.

Chairman Stone recognized the departments of the 2025 All-Academic Team winners and the 2025 Ford C. Frick award to the Department of Texas for having the national runner-

up team, League City, TX, Post 554; and recognized the Howard P. Savage award to the Department of Virginia for having the 2025 National Champions, Chesapeake, VA Post 280.

Program Manager Steve Cloud provided a wrap-up of the 2025 season. Cloud reviewed the baseball program's active governing resolutions, rules and policies at the national and department level. Also, Cloud provided updates from meetings with USA Baseball, U.S. Olympic and Paralympics Council and National Federation of High Schools throughout the season.

The 2025 season finished with 2,786 certified teams. This is a decline of 187 teams for last season. The Department of Georgia did not have a program this year.

American Legion Baseball Assistant Program Manager Tom Starnes (IN) provided a review of online team registration issues and updates on registration payment issues, SportsEngine billing, and team refund process and procedures.

Chairman Stone conducted formal discussions on the proposed rule changes submitted which included Rule 1.G: Courtesy Runners, to include post-season play; Rule 1.I: DH Rule, adopt Ohtani rule; Rule 1.S: Pitching Rule, remove appearance in consecutive games/days; Rule 2.A: Player Age, change cut-off date to September 1; Rule 3, 4: Enrollment Number, suggestions to increase/decrease/eliminate; Rule 6.D: Dual Participation, change from regular season to include start of regional play; Rule 6.E: Players per Team, increase roster size from 18 players to 20; Rule 6.E.1: Affiliated Team, change definition to allow Junior/Senior teams with same base school but different school enrollment combination; Requests to add new rules which include adding the safety base at 1B; add new rule to allow one-way electronic communication between manage and catcher; and a suggestion to eliminate team per diem from national tournaments. These recommendations will be reviewed by the ALB Committee for consideration during their Fall Meeting.

Chairman Stone reviewed the 2025-2026 program dates and deadlines. He stressed to the chairmen the importance of communicating these dates to their teams, as there were several national appeals dealing with missed deadline issues.

Program Manager Cloud reviewed the 2026 regional formats that include two superregional sites in Shrewsbury, Massachusetts, and Cherryville, North Carolina on a trial basis. Cloud also covered the proposed regional alignments and six-team double elimination pairings that removed the six additional teams needed to field the 64-team pairings. Removing these additional teams will be a significant budget savings.

A robust discussion with the department baseball chairman regarding the impact of moving national tournaments up a week earlier. The survey that was provided to the baseball chairmen, department adjutants and team managers was reviewed. There were 347 responses representing 12% of the total stakeholders solicited and 75% of the respondents were team managers. Findings from the survey show that there is significant conflict between the positive benefits of player retention and the severe negative impact of further compressing an already short regular season.

National Tournament Umpire Assignor and Baseball Committee consultant, Jay DeSantis reviewed the umpire nomination, selection, and promotion process of national tournament umpiring staff. Instructions on sending the forms to the national office prior to the November 1<sup>st</sup> deadline date were provided.

ALB vice chairman, Jody Moeller (NE) presented information regarding Hudl, a sports management software providing coaches and athletes the ability to review game footage, improve team play, and athlete recruiting.

Conference attendee Judy Leonardi from Department of California baseball marketing volunteer discussed various fundraising ideas and opportunities for department chairmen and how it has positively impacted the California baseball program.

Assistant Program Manager Starnes welcomed the newly appointed department baseball chairmen and reviewed the responsibilities of the position. Starnes conducted a "New Chairman Training" session for new chairmen.

Chairman Stone thanked the attendees for their attention and participation during the conference. He asked committee member John DuVall (NC) for the closing benediction.

### AMERICAN LEGION BASEBALL COMMITTEE Gary Stone (MO), Chairman

The American Legion Baseball (ALB) Committee met via conference call on Tuesday, September 30. Those in attendance were Gary Stone (MO), Chairman; Jody Moeller (NE), Vice Chairman; Committee members Richard Paster (MA); Lewis Jones (PA); Ron Edwards (MT); and Jeral Howard (AR). Also in attendance were consultants Jeff Miller (MN); Jay DeSantis (WV) and Eddie Holbrook (NC); Adjutant Advisory Board members Mark Cauble (NC), Americanism Commission Chairman Mark Avis; and national headquarters staff Steve Cloud (IN), Baseball Operations Program Manager, Americanism Division, and Tom Starnes (IN), Assistant Baseball Operations Program Manager, Americanism Division.

Program Manager Steve Cloud provided the ALB Committee with a 2025 regional and world series wrap up. The 2025 season finished with 2,786 certified teams. This is a decline of 187 teams for last season. The Department of Georgia did not have a program this year.

A follow up discussion from the department baseball chairman conference regarding the impact of possibly moving national tournaments up a week earlier was held. The survey that was provided to the baseball chairmen, department adjutants and team managers was reviewed. There were 347 responses representing 12% of the total stakeholders solicited and 75% of the respondents were team managers. Findings from the survey show that there is significant conflict between the positive benefits of player retention and the severe negative impact of further compressing an already short regular season. While no changes will happen in 2026, discussions will continue for possible future seasons.

The ALB committee recommends the following rule changes for the 2026 ALB season.

Rule 1.G: <u>Courtesy Runners</u> allow regular and post-season play.

New Rule 1.S: <u>One-Way Communication</u> allows one-way communication between manager and catcher.

Rule 6.D: <u>Dual Participation</u> clarification of "Point of Emphasis" to include player combine events.

Rule 9.L: <u>Minimum Active Players</u> senior team is permitted to bring up players from registered affiliated junior team's roster not to exceed 18 players prior to the beginning of national tournaments.

New Rule 9.M: <u>Between Inning Time Limit</u> teams have 120 seconds (or 150 seconds for a relief pitcher) to be ready for the first pitch (pitcher holding the ball and touching the

pitcher's plate and a batter standing in the batter's box ready to hit). The 120 second clock (or 150 second clock for a relief pitcher) shall start when all defensive players have started to leave their positions after the last out has been made and stops when the umpire calls "Play" for the first pitch of the first batter of the next half-inning.

Program Manager Cloud briefed the ALB Committee on the 2026 regional formats that include two super-regional sites in Shrewsbury, Massachusetts, and Cherryville, North Carolina on a trial basis. Cloud also covered the proposed regional alignments and six-team double elimination pairings that removed the six additional teams needed to field the 64-team pairings. Removing these additional teams will be a significant budget savings.

The conference convened on Friday evening in joint session with The American Legion National Americanism conference with greetings from The American Legion Americanism Chaiman Mark Avis, and guest speakers were Ruthie Culbertson, Deputy Director of Marketing TAL, Steve Brooks, Social Media Manager TAL, Henry Howard, Deputy Director Media and Communications TAL, and Jeff Stouffer, Director of Media and Communications TAL.

On Saturday the 27<sup>th</sup>, Boys Nation Director, Past National Commander Clarence Hill, kicked off the Boys State conference a Boys Nation video and talked the importance of the Boys Nation staff applications from Department Boys State programs, with the need to be sent through the Department Adjutant and emailed to boysnation@legion.org

The 2025 National Finals were discussed at great lengths. The consensus from everyone attending was that the move to Hillsdale College has not only been cost effective, but a great success. # Afternoon Session Commission Reports

## INTERNAL AFFAIRS COMMISSION REPORT TO THE NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE October 8-9, 2025

The Internal Affairs Commission was called to order at 9:00 a.m., October 6, and at 8:30 a.m., October 7, in 314A, National Headquarters, Indianapolis, Indiana. We had nineteen members and several guests.

The report consists of the following sections: Standing Committee Reports; Subcommittee Reports; Program Reports; Staff Action Reports; and Actions on Assigned Resolutions.

#### I. STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

# MEMBERSHIP AND POST ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE MIKE COOKE (WY), CHAIRMAN

The 2026 traditional membership goal is 1,367,356. As of October 7, 2025, the 2026 membership total is 799,809 - 1,772 members behind this same time for the traditional membership report of 2025. These membership results do not include newly acquired 2026 DMS members or encumbered renewals.

The overall intent of DMS has always been to engage these members, educate them about the benefits of being a member of The American Legion and encourage them to transfer into a local post. The total new DMS members acquired to date is 17,780. 20,083 encumbered members have renewed for 2026. These encumbered members should be used to replace those members who transfer to post everlasting or choose not to renew.

During the recent 50% Target Date, 47 departments exceeded the target date – this is thirteen departments more than the 2025 membership campaign. The 55% target is the next target date. This will be on October 15, 2025 – 48 departments have already met this goal.

National Commander Wiley outlined at the National Membership Workshop his six challenges to departments: Be The One, Better Together, Legislative Agenda, The 3 C's, Veterans and Children Foundation, and America 250.

Commander Wiley set a goal for posts and departments to work towards a renewal rate of 90% which in-turn will increase the renewal rate for the organization. Commander Wiley also set a goal to recruit 75,000 new traditional members. We need to increase the number of new members brought in each year if we are going to grow as an organization. To date, we have recruited 19,707. We need 55,293 new members to attain this goal.

The online renewal program continues to be a great tool for members. The 2025 campaign saw 212,105 members who renewed online. Members can set up their membership to auto-renew and now they have the option to renew their membership for three years at a time. 56,580 individuals have taken advantage of the multiyear option -6,733 have joined and 49,847 individuals have renewed using the multiyear option. Members are encouraged to use one or both options when they log on to renew. When a member selects one of these options, it will decrease the number of renewal notices that will need to be sent out next year.

- Submit op-eds or community columns
- Share photos and stories with Department and National channels
- 3. Promote "Celebrate and Educate" Themes Use 250th events to revive and amplify:
  - Flag education & etiquette
  - Vets in the Classroom
  - Civics education and citizenship
  - Service narratives (highlighting what military and veteran service means today)
  - Collaborate with schools, libraries, and civic orgs to host events and forums tied to these themes.

#### 4. Support the USA 250 Challenge

- Treat the USA 250 Challenge as both a wellness initiative and a media & branding opportunity.
- Feature participants in local news (human interest stories)
- Encourage teams to wear the shirts at events
- Run monthly spotlights on those logging hours for fitness, wellness, and service

#### 5. Connect with America 250 State Commissions

- Compile a list of state and territory America 250 Commissions
- Share with posts and departments to help initiate contact
- Offer M&PA support for messaging, presence, and branding in joint events
- Where commissions are inactive, encourage the Legion Family to lead

#### 6. Create a National Communications Calendar

- Help posts plan ahead with a shared calendar of key milestones and ideas (e.g., Battle of Bunker Hill, Paul Revere Ride reenactment, July 4, etc.)
- Suggest timely angles and hooks to connect with current events or seasonal campaigns

#### 7. Brand Every Event

- Ensure every 250th activity is visibly connected to:
- The American Legion brand
- USA 250 branding
- The mission of patriotism and education

# Toolkit Development: "If We Give Them a Recipe, They Will Cook":

#### M&PA Committee should offer:

- Simple event "recipes" for posts (e.g., "How to host a Flag Day ceremony + media kit")
- Quick-win templates that posts can customize
- Examples from other posts as models of success (short case studies)

#### Final Thought:

This is not just about celebration — it's about reconnection and relevance. The 250th is a rare national moment to:

- Reignite patriotism
- Close divides between veterans and civilians
- Drive membership growth
- Reaffirm The American Legion as a community leader
- Media will be watching the M&PA Committee must ensure they're seeing Legionnaires leading the way.

# Legion+ App & CRM System Update - Presented by Dave Sutton (IN), Director of IT

#### The Legion+ App was created to:

- Help posts update their information easily
- Serve as a recruitment and engagement tool

Though not fully launched, the app is on track to be ready by the end of the year.

Key features in progress:

- Integration with Personify for real-time data syncing
- New portal profile management with enhanced security
- Future ability for Post Adjutants and Commanders to approve new recruits directly through the app
- Upcoming tools for billing, donations, and accepting funds online

The IT team is actively seeking feedback from posts to learn: What do posts need, and how can IT support them better?

Data Integrity Measures - Important safeguards are being developed to:

- Prevent duplicate sign-ups through the Direct Membership Solicitation (DMS) system
- Improve member identification using email addresses

#### **New Legion CRM System:**

A new Customer Relationship Management (CRM) system is in development to improve how the Legion manages member data and interactions.

- Testing is scheduled to begin after the Fall Meetings
- Small group remote training sessions will be offered during rollout
- Goal: Better user experience, cleaner data management, improved service to members

<u>Direct Mail Solicitation (DMS) Strategy Update</u> - Presented by Chuck Krupa, Senior Direct Marketing Strategist, Office of Fund Development

#### **Changing Strategies for a New Generation:**

The American Legion's approach to new member acquisition has shifted dramatically. Previously, recruitment was driven almost entirely by direct mail, which left younger veterans largely unreached.

#### **Modern Multi-Channel Outreach:**

To expand reach and effectiveness, the Legion is now utilizing:

- Snippet videos
- Influencer marketing
- Comedy clips

These digital methods are designed to attract a broader audience — especially younger veterans — into the DMS pipeline.

**2026 Membership Acquisition Goals** - Target: Recruit 86,000 new members by 2026 Strategy includes:

- Improved renewal process
- Enhanced welcome kit
- A 7-week Email Welcome Series to engage and educate new members

#### **Email Welcome Series Breakdown:**

## TRAINING SUBCOMMITTEE STEVEN SPERL (AZ), CHAIRMAN

The Training Subcommittee convened in the Internal Affairs & Membership conference room at National Headquarters to evaluate national training strategy, review program implementation, and align priorities with organizational goals, emphasizing cohesion across national training efforts and measurable member impact.

Training Tuesday Update - The subcommittee reviewed Training Tuesday sessions delivered during the reporting window and confirmed attendance thresholds at twenty minutes. Sessions on May 27, 2025 (74 attendees), July 29, 2025 (28 attendees), and September 30, 2025 (35 attendees) produced a total of 126 unique participants, including four staff. Participants valued interactive scenarios, expanded Q&A, and post session materials. The subcommittee will continue the series with Resolutions Workshop IV on the resolved clause, Post Operations focused on officer roles and Post Executive Committee structure, Community Engagement, and Post Conflict Resolution. The group will draft outlines following Fall meetings and target instructor selection by the end of October.

NRIC Review and Planning - The subcommittee reviewed feedback from Denver and Boston and noted strengths in applied learning and peer discussion alongside needs for improved pacing and A/V coordination. The 2026 NRICs are confirmed for Indianapolis on January 31, 2026, and Atlanta on February 7, 2026. The team will prioritize departments within driving range, employ QR code flyers and leader focused information.

National American Legion College (NALC) - Status the National American Legion College (NALC) is scheduled for November 16–21, 2025. The 2025 NALC curriculum has been finalized with emphasis on Servant Leadership, mentorship, and structured, participant centered outcomes. National staff issued acceptance notifications and will distribute read ahead packets following planning meetings. A post cohort survey will measure impact and inform 2026 improvements.

National Instructor Corps & Development Pipeline - National launched the training onboarding process last April and established an instructor pool of approximately forty vetted facilitators. We prioritize this pool first when filling Training Tuesday, NRIC, NALC, Membership Workshop, and ad hoc opportunities. The pipeline remains open—prospective instructors can apply at any time from any department—and National coordinates onboarding and rubric based evaluation to ensure consistent delivery. Coordination meetings with instructors will maintain standards, gather field feedback, and plan for future training opportunities; sessions are scheduled for January 7, 2026, at 1:30 p.m. ET, and April 1, 2026, at 1:30 p.m. ET.

<u>Strategic Integration</u> - The subcommittee continues to align planning with the 21st Century Report and prioritize mentorship, alumni tracking, platform modernization, and inclusive digital access. The group affirmed the need to bridge national efforts with post level impact by sharing adaptable materials and enabling local facilitation.

<u>Next Steps and Assignments</u> - The Training Coordinator maintains a current standardized presentation template and curriculum outlines for NRIC sessions to strengthen continuity and branding. The Training Coordinator will convene the January 7 and April 1 training subcommittee meetings.

The report of the Training Subcommittee was received and filed by the Internal Affairs Commission.

#### Fall 2025 Meeting of the 21st Century Subcommittee

On Monday, October 6<sup>th</sup>, 2025, at 10:00 AM, members of the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Subcommittee convened to discuss progress that has been made regarding the implementation of the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Report. Subcommittee members were given a copy of the Strategic Plan that was prepared by the M&PA Committee's 21<sup>st</sup> Century Subcommittee and had the opportunity to receive a briefing from Chairman Cooke. Chairman Cooke discussed with the subcommittee that the key to moving forward with the work that has been done is to ensure that it is disseminated down to the department and post levels. Chairman Cooke informed the subcommittee that he looked forward to any input that they may have.

During their discussion the subcommittee reviewed and agreed with the base of the M&PA subcommittee's plan. It was then moved that the plan should be distributed to the departments for dissemination to the posts before the end of calendar year 2025. This will allow their work to commence as soon as possible.

The subcommittee recommends that when the Strategic Plan is released the M&PA Committee begin the work of aligning the plan with SMART Goals of how the Strategic Plan is to be accomplished.

- $S \underline{Specific}$ : Well defined, clear, and stating exactly what is to be accomplished
- $M \underline{Measurable}$ : It must be something that can be tracked to allow us to know how close we are to achieving it.
- A <u>Attainable</u>: Should be realistic that can be accomplished in the given timeframe and available resources.
- $R \underline{Realistic:}$  Must be aligned with our broader objectives.
- T <u>Time-bound:</u> the goal must have a specific deadline or target date, thus simplifying the ability to stay on track and maintain accountability.

The report of the 21st Century Subcommittee was received and filed by the Internal Affairs Commission.

# CONSOLIDATED POST REPORT REVIEW SUBCOMMITTEE JAMES R. BOJANOWSKI (NY), CHAIRMAN

The primary focus of the 2025 CPR Review Team was to increase the post completion rate across departments and improve tools, communications, and training that support timely and accurate submission of the Consolidated Post Report (CPR).

CPR suggestions/recommendations (2025-2026):

### • Modernize the printed CPR for accessibility and efficiency.

- Reduce spare copies of CPR form to one. Posts/Departments may make copies as necessary. Only one copy needs to be filed with national.
- Increase font size and reformat the CPR form as a concise two-page document.
- Printed CPR should be 8 ½ by 11, versus the current 14-inch paper.

#### • Enhance MyLegion CPR functionality:

- Add an option to attach supporting documents/files to MyLegion CPR submissions as stated in the instructions.
- Implement a post-submission "Print Standard CPR/CSR" option that renders the official form layout for post/department filing, sharing, reporting, and department-level award packets. It is currently a 10+ page printed report.
- Implement an automatic submit feature: any MyLegion CPR draft with two (2) or more responses auto-submits on July 1 while still permitting manual submission earlier in the year.
- Ensure departments have access in Personify to pull CPR Status and CPR Summary reports.
- Maintain parity across all versions (MyLegion, downloadable internet form, and paper) in fields, instructions, and output formatting.
- Potentially add a line item for Military Honors hours.

## Recognition and incentives:

- Encourage departments to create and distribute awards for CPR submissions (e.g., early submission, quality/impact, completeness) and for districts with high submission rates.
- Encourage departments to require a CPR submission from each post to be eligible for any department-level post awards.

#### • Communications and messaging:

- Staff will continue CPR messaging and status reporting in the Dispatch.
- Request Media & Communications to develop a one-page Legion Magazine article explaining CPR purpose/importance, submission methods (MyLegion, paper), and department/national awards.
- Encourage departments to publish completion-rate updates late in the Legion year to drive final-month submissions.

### • Best practices and training:

- Staff will create and distribute a CPR Best Practices guide for departments (collection tips, internal timelines, district coaching, and quality checks).
- Execute a CPR-focused Training Tuesday in April 2026.
- Host a CPR expert panel as part of national convention training offerings.
- Provide a CPR training session at the Americanism Conference.
- Continue to integrate CPR content into National Membership Workshop and other national/dept training as appropriate.

# • Reporting efficiency and analytics.

- Reduce the number of printed pages for a submitted CPR by generating a summarized output (with detailed data available digitally).
- Explore an "Impact Report" in Personify that aggregates CPR data into department- and district-level visuals/narratives to communicate local outcomes.

The report of the Consolidated Post Report Review Subcommittee was received and filed by the Internal Affairs Commission.

#### III. PROGRAM REPORTS

#### SONS OF THE AMERICAN LEGION (SAL)

Over the past year the Sons of The American Legion continued as a committed member of the American Legion Family and achieved positive gains in all areas. Over the period we increased our support of our Nation's veterans, children and youth, and local communities.

The SAL was the single largest contributor to the American Legion Child Well-Being Foundation in 2025 raising \$300,187.13, which is \$0.76 per member. Total donations from the Sons of The American Legion to CWF now exceeds \$10 million since 1987.

For the 2024-2025 Administrative Year, the Sons of The American Legion had 7,740,001 volunteer hours. The monetary value of these hours is equivalent to \$269,274,628.

The 2024-2025 SAL Accomplishments Report is included at the end of this report. These numbers continue to rise as the organization grows in membership and we increase compliance with reporting.

The SAL surpassed the 400,000 members mark shortly before the 2025 National Convention. Our membership goal for 2026 is 409,244 members. As of September 29, 2025, we have 88,276 members which is 21.57% of goal. Our current renewal rate is 19.35%.

# HIGHLIGHTS OF THE SONS OF THE AMERICAN LEGION 53<sup>RD</sup> ANNUAL NATIONAL CONVENTION

At the Fifty-Third Annual National Convention in Tampa, Florida there were 1,055 registered delegates, 21 alternates, 92 guests and 54 Detachments.

We received donations totaling \$111,414.25 from various squadrons and detachments. The breakout is as follows:

- \$ 59,876 for the Child Well-Being Foundation
- \$ 500 for the Children's Miracle Network
- \$ 750 for Fisher House
- \$ 1,150 for the Legacy Scholarship Fund
- \$ 8,350 for the National Emergency Fund
- \$ 22,185 for Operation Comfort Warriors
- \$ 16,193 for the Veterans and Children Foundation
- \$ 2,460 for other programs

There was one resolution submitted for consideration at the National Convention, an amendment held for further study while The American Legion is reviewing the SAL's Constitution and Bylaws.

# HIGHLIGHTS OF THE FALL NATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

One hundred eighty-three (183) National Executive Committeemen, Alternates, Commission and Committee members and guests attended the 2025 Fall National Executive Committee meeting representing fifty-five detachments. The attendance was outstanding showing that our members are truly dedicated to the programs.

We received donations from our members totaling \$12,340 to the following programs:

- \$ 9,290 for the Child Well-Being Foundation
- \$ 750 for the National Emergency Fund
- \$ 1,800 for the Veterans and Children Foundation
- \$ 500 for the Children's Organ Transplant Association

Three resolutions were adopted by the SAL NEC:

- SAL Resolution 12 Spring 2025 (Donation of \$250,000 to VCF)
- SAL Resolution 4 Spring 2025 (100% of Quota Membership Award)
- SAL Resolution 1 Fall 2025 (Rename the Public and Media Communications Commission)

The Sons of The American Legion is continuing to strive to assist The American Legion in all aspects. Our dedication to the veterans and their families can only strengthen our bond within the American Legion Family. We will continue to ensure more productive, in-depth programs so that the Sons of The American Legion will become a stronger asset to The American Legion.

The Sons of The American Legion will continue to work for the benefit of our veterans who helped make this country great and for the children who will help make this country even greater.

On behalf of the members of the Sons of The American Legion, I would like to thank the Internal Affairs Commission and the division staff for their help and guidance. A special thanks to Mr. Robert E. Newman, Mr. James Baca, Mr. Matt Herndon, and Mr. Kevin Mook for their continued perseverance and dedication to the SAL program.

We continue to see increased participation within the commissions and committees of our National Executive Committee from which our further growth is ensured. The war on terrorism, which has put our troops in harm's way, has only strengthened our resolve to ensure the success of the programs of the American Legion Family.

#### IV. NATIONAL STAFF UPDATES;

# NATIONAL EMERGENCY FUND

Since its creation in 1989, the National Emergency Fund (NEF) has awarded nearly \$10M to American Legion members and posts. Up to \$3,000 is available for members, and up to \$10,000 is available for posts that, because of a declared natural disaster, temporarily lose the ability to maintain existing Four Pillar programs within the community.

In 2024 we approved 109 grants (95 individual and 14 post) totaling \$313,697.98. Most of the grants distributed in 2024 were for Hurricanes Helene and Milton. We had NEF grant requests that were approved within the following departments in 2024: Departments of Florida (83), Georgia (1), Indiana (1), Iowa (6), Louisiana (2), New York (1), North Carolina (2), Philippines (1), South Carolina (3), South Dakota (2), Tennessee (4), and Texas (3).

Since Jan. 1, 2025, we have granted \$150,157.76 in emergency assistance to 32 members and eight posts, compared to \$43,411.19 on this date in 2024. So far there have been 147 donations for a total of \$303,779.00.

The trust has \$6,558,756.81 as of August 31, 2025.

#### **CONSOLIDATED POST REPORTS (CPR)**

Thirteen departments accomplished 100% CPR reporting and were presented with national commander plaques onstage at the national convention. All 75% - 99% were mailed certificates of

commendation and their accomplishments and were applauded onstage. The national reporting average is 66.85% as of the reporting deadline of July 1, 2025.

Geiger Operations Center continued to collect CPR data until September 12, 2025, from our 11,742 active posts. The additional CPR forms submitted by that date raised the percentage to **76.66 percent** which added important data for national program use and our annual report to Congress.

The 2025-2026 reporting period runs from June 1, 2025, to May 31, 2026. We have a CPR launch date for 2025-2026 to be available on Mylegion.org no later than November 12, 2025.

#### **OPERATION COMFORT WARRIORS (OCW)**

#### **Eligibility:**

Facilities: Those eligible for OCW assistance include Department of Defense (DoD) and VA medical facilities and clinics, wounded warrior regiments, battalions, or units, Soldier & Family Assistance Centers, or any other DoD medical care facility. State funded veterans' facilities are not eligible for this program. Other non-profit facilities serving veterans or active-duty service members, e.g., USO, Fisher House, etc., are considered on a case-by-case basis. OCW <u>is not</u> a program designed to provide facilities assistance with building construction, improvements, repairs, or furnishings.

Events: Sponsors of veteran-centric events focused on veterans can apply for a grant to cover the cost of items directly benefiting the veteran (food, take home' items, safety/medical items, consumables). This includes, but is not limited to fishing trips, cookouts, rafting/camping trips, sporting events, and trips to amusement parks. OCW funds *cannot* be used for administrative overhead, salaries, rental spaces, or anything that does not directly benefit the veterans involved in the event.

As a rule, OCW does not give grants directly to other non-profit organizations unless the event is sponsored by a post or department and The American Legion receives prominent credit and name recognition for its sponsorship. The American Legion should always be the primary sponsor in these situations, so the public knows that The American Legion is providing the assistance.

#### Impact:

Nearly 1,000 servicemembers, veterans and their families were directly impacted by Operation Comfort Warriors in 2024, either by participating in an OCW-sponsored event or receiving care at a grant-receiving facility. \$89,639.57 was distributed through 2 individual and 7 event grants. In 2025, 8 grants have been distributed in the amount of \$95,500.00 impacting over 1,300 servicemembers, veterans, and their families.

#### THE AMERICAN LEGION LEGACY RUN

The National Legacy Run is much more than a once-a-year event, it also serves as the catalyst for department fundraising efforts and in-state legacy runs throughout the year. The American Legion Riders are the only program under The American Legion that includes the entire American Legion Family, Legionnaires, Auxiliary, and Son's of The American Legion.

To begin our 19th annual run, The American Legion and the broader veteran community continued the exciting mission to raise funds for the Veterans & Children's Foundation. This year's ride traversed 5 states and covered 815 miles starting at Post 8 in South Boston VA, and ending at Wesley Chapel Harley Davidson in Lutz, FL. We left South Boston with over 300 motorcycles lined up behind Ken Nadeau and Dave Heredia, spanning more than 5 miles and averaging 275 motorcycles per day during the run. As we rode the coastline of eastern America, we interacted with 4 American Legion posts, where we enjoyed the hospitality of our Legion Family and community partners. We relished riding past historical bases like Fort Bragg heading into the coastline of North Carolina toward Myrtle Beach. Spreading esprit de corps to our fellow Devil Dogs in Marine Corps Air Station Beaufort. Blazing past Fort Stewart's mechanized infantry division into the bold city of Jacksonville, FL.

Throughout the journey we had the distinguished honor of seeing locations like the Woodpeckers Baseball Stadium, where our national commander threw out the first pitch, the Battleship North Carolina, Aircraft Carrier USS Yorktown, Bryant Commons Park, POW/MIA Memorial Park and a final leg heading into Northern Tampa Bay, ending in Wesley Chapel Harley Davidson in Lutz, FL.

The final total was over \$855,000 at the national convention.

#### **OCTOBER 8-9, 2025**

#### **VA&R POLICY UPDATE**

#### Legislative Bill Reviews

The Health and Benefits Policy Teams reviewed eight policy-related bills in September, S. 2145 Guard Veterans Health Act, S. 2412 VA Acquisitions Reform Act, S. XXXX Stuck on Hold Act, H.R. 211 Equal Access to Contraception for Vets Act, H.R. 4855 Veteran Families Health Services Act, H.R. 4637 Veterans' Surviving Spouse Equity Act, H.R. 4876 Reproductive Freedom for Veterans Act, and H.R. XXX Sharri Briley and Eric Edmundson Veterans Benefits Expansion Act. This brings the total bills reviewed by the VA&R team since January 2025 to 149.

#### System Worth Saving Program

The American Legion's Health Policy Team will conduct the final SWS Site Visit for 2025 Des Moines VAMC – Des Moines, IA, November 2025.

#### Proposed System Worth Saving Site Visits for 2026

Through its System Worth Saving (SWS) program, the American Legion plans to visit four VA medical facilities between March and December 2026to review the quality of healthcare, access, outpatient wait time, and other critical healthcare outcomes. Site selection will be based on compiled information and rankings related to the complexity and severity of challenges with access, wait time, suicide rates, and other factors at the VA facility. #### 21st Century Ad-Hoc American Legion Committee related update

The VA&R Commission is uniquely positioned to assist in the implementation of 21 Century Ad-Hoc Committee recommendations and has taken significant steps towards these goals. The American Legion has an unwavering commitment to reducing veteran suicide. Addressing this challenge requires ensuring that veterans and their families understand suicide risk factors, are equipped to communicate effectively with those in crisis, and know how to access available resources. Our nationally recognized Be the One suicide awareness initiative and the Buddy Check program allows The American Legion to reach out to veterans in meaningful ways, reminding those who served that they are never alone. The inspiring speaker who presented at our VA&R Commission meeting shared powerful, innovative approaches to discuss suicide prevention, emphasizing the strength of peer support, and the impact of hands-on engagement. Together, we are fostering a culture of care, resilience, and solidarity that ensures no veteran is left to face their struggles alone.

The American Legion recognizes the critical role of innovation in advancing VA healthcare. This year, The American Legion partnered with the Department of Veterans Affairs for its 2nd Annual Hackathon. This event brought together innovative veterans, students and VA employees to develop and present innovative solutions for improving VA healthcare delivery.

The VA&R Team participated in a broad range of meetings with the VA, national partners, and other VSOs to address key issues impacting veterans. These engagements included quarterly meetings and roundtables.

#### BENEFITS AND CLAIM SERVICES UPDATE

#### The American Legion Accreditation & Training (ALAT) School

In December 2023, The American Legion launched a rebranded training program in partnership with Bergmann & Moore, LLC., for Department Service Officers called The American Legion Accreditation and Training School (ALAT). This is the first rebranding since the VA&R Commission was authorized to conduct DSO training in 1985.

The new ALAT features three levels of training: Beginner 101 Course (online), Intermediate 201/Appeals 202 Course (online) and the DSO Symposium 301 (residential, in-person). The new branding conveys a clear focus on accreditation & education for our service officers. This also resonates with both aspiring and existing accredited service officers seeking continuing education in the field. This training is only permitted to members who are seeking to be accredited or current VA-accredited service officers seeking continued education. The Department Adjutants' approval is required for anyone seeking to attend ALAT training.

As of June 30, 2025, the new ALAT School has conducted eight (8) Beginner 101 Courses, one (1) Intermediate 201 Course, one (1) Appeals 201 Course, and one (1) DSO Symposium 301 with a total number of graduates 629.

# National Legislative Commission Fall NEC Report Sep 26, 2025

Matthew Shuman, Arizona, Chairman

This report summarizes the commission and congressional actions since the 106th National Convention on issues of particular concern to The American Legion. The report is arranged by program areas.

#### RECENT CONGRESSIONAL DEVELOPMENTS

Following the 2025 National Convention in Tampa, Florida, the Senate and the House of Representatives reconvened on September 2<sup>nd</sup>. Since their return, both chambers have been deep in hearings and deliberations regarding the Fiscal Year (FY) 2026 annual appropriations bills.

Tensions are high in Congress as the Federal Government's operation funding is set to lapse on September 30, 2025. The possibility of at least a partial government shutdown beginning in October looms nearer as members from both sides of the aisle continue to cancel meetings with the other side. Leaders from both the majority and the minority are putting the blame on the shutdown on the opposing party's priorities.

In preparation for this possibility, the Legislative Division is preparing a message to the membership to explain what, if any, impact that a government shutdown would have on their access to benefits and answer frequently asked questions.

In mid-September, the House passed 14 bipartisan veterans' bills, including Protecting Veteran Access to Telemedicine Services Act (H.R. 1107), TRAVEL Act (H.R. 3400), VA Hospital Inventory Management System Authorization Act (H.R. 3494), and the Edith Nourse Rogers STEM Scholarship Opportunity Act (H.R.2034). The American Legion has testified on 10 of these bills before the House and Senate Committees on Veterans' Affairs.

#### VETERANS AFFAIRS AND REHABILITATION

Since the 106th National Convention, The American Legion has continued to advocate for policies that improve the delivery of health care, benefits, and rehabilitation services for veterans and their families.

Of the 14 veterans' bills passed in the House, several fall directly under the portfolio of Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation. These include the Women Veterans Cancer Care Coordination Act (H.R. 1860), which expands access to coordinated cancer treatment for women veterans, and the

Rural Veteran Improved Access to Benefits Act of 2025 (H.R. 3951), designed to reduce disparities in benefits delivery for rural veterans. The American Legion strongly supports both measures and continues to work with Senate offices to ensure swift passage.

Finally, the Legislative Division continues to oppose any effort to subject veterans' benefits or health care to PAYGO offsets. The American Legion has made clear to lawmakers that veterans' earned benefits are a moral obligation, not a budgetary bargaining chip.

#### VETERANS EMPLOYMENT AND EDUCATION

On August 25, 2025, The American Legion participated in a roundtable discussion on the status of the West Los Angeles Veterans Affairs campus hosted by House Committee on Veterans' Affairs Ranking Member Mark Takano (D-CA). Legionnaire Manuel Vega (CA) represented The American Legion and was joined on the panel by 15-20 other veterans and representatives from other Veterans Service Organizations. Representative Brad Sherman (D-CA) and Representative Sydney Kamlager-Dove (D-CA) also participated in the discussion.

Participants expressed their concern about ongoing security issues at the West LA VA campus and issues regarding how land allocated to the VA has been used for purposes other than carrying for veterans. Recommendations included improving security before expanding the number of housing units, reforming rules for who is eligible to be housed, and reconstituting a homeless veterans advisory committee to the Secretary of Veterans Affairs that has so far not been reconvened under the Trump Administration.

#### **NATIONAL SECURITY**

To address issues with domestic shipbuilding capacity, Senator Mark Kelly (D-AZ) and Senator Todd Young (R-IN) reintroduced the SHIPS for America Act, 2020 in April. This bipartisan legislation would revitalize the U.S. Merchant Marine fleet to rebuild domestic shipbuilding capacity and improve the competitiveness of U.S. flagged vessels in international commerce. The Legislative Division has been meeting with the staff of Senators Kelly and Senator Young to see how the American Legion can best support this legislation. A House companion bill was introduced in May 2025 by Rep Trent Kelly (R-MS) that has 78 Republican and Democratic cosponsors.

In July, the Senate Armed Service Committee (SASC) voted 26-1 to advance the FY26 NDAA. The FY26 NDAA authorizes \$925 billion in total national defense spending, \$878.7 billion to the Department of Defense, \$35.2 billion to the Department of Energy and \$10.8 billion for defense-related activities outside NDAA jurisdiction. The House companion FY26 NDAA bill passed the Armed Services Committee on July 15, with a 55-2 vote. Like the Senate version, the 2026 NDAA is largely focused on reforming the Pentagon's acquisition and procurement processes and is set to lift total defense spending to \$1 trillion in the next fiscal year.

On September 10, the House of Representatives voted 231-196 to pass the House version of the FY26 NDAA. The Senate version of the FY26 NDAA has still not been brought to the floor for a vote. National Legislative Division has continued to advocate to Congress that they include the following amendments and text in the final version of the NDAA:

- Report on reducing frequency of permanent changes of station and naval vessel to onshore rotations (House Rules Amendment 171) The American Legion supports efforts to provide more stability for servicemembers and their families. Service members and their families bear the brunt of frequent moves through permanent changes of station (PCS). Frequent moves pose a quality-of-life issue for military families, which may negatively impact retention and recruitment numbers. Establishing a report requirement allows for options to reduce the frequency of PCS moves and rotations of Navy service members between assignments to naval vessels and onshore assignments.
- Prohibition on use of funds to reduce the workforce at public shipyards (Senate Sec. 1108) The American Legion calls for increased investment toward our domestic shipyards. The workforce at our public shipyards is integral to our national security. This prohibition ensures that none of the funds authorized to be appropriated by the NDAA are used to reduce the workforce at public shipyards.
- Assess U.S. supply chains for critical minerals essential to defense manufacturing (House Rules Amendment 155) The American Legion supports Congress to expand key defense industries, including rare earth production. Requiring a GAO assessment report will identify barriers and recommend actions that federal agencies and Congress should take to incentivize domestic production.
- Reauthorization of Appropriations for the Coast Guard through Fiscal Year 2029 (House Rules Amendment 846) The American Legion fully supports funding for the Coast Guard to support its critical mission. The Coast Guard plays a critical role in national security, maritime safety, drug interdiction, and disaster response. Reauthorizing appropriations through FY 2029 ensures long-term stability and readiness, enabling the Coast Guard to modernize its fleet, invest in personnel, and maintain vital homeland defense operations.
- Repeal of the 2002 and 1991 Authorization for Use of Military Force (AUMFs) (H.R. 1488) Repealing the outdated 2002 and 1991 (House Rules Amendment 806) The American Legion encourages Congress to repeal and replace outdated AUMFs. Ending these long-expired authorizations prevents their misuse and reflects the changing landscape, ensuring that any future military engagement is based on current threats and clear objectives.
- HR 1932, *Pay Our Troops Act*: This bill provides continuing appropriations for military pay for any period during which interim or full-year appropriations are not in effect. If a government shutdown occurs, pay and allowances for members of the Armed Forces, including reserve components performing active service, civilian personnel and contractors will not be affected. This bill has 34 Republican and Democrat cosponsors.
- HR 3332/S.1740, *Pacific Partnership Act*: The Pacific Partnership Act will bolster United States engagement with Pacific Islands by developing a coherent strategy for engagement in the region. The American Legion urges Congress to pass this bipartisan measure to deter malign influence in a region of strategic importance to the United States. The House version has 22 Republican and Democratic cosponsors, and the Senate version was introduced by Rep Cortez Masto (D-NV) and cosponsored by Senator Joni Ernst (R-IA).

• HR 488/S 150, Combating Cartels on Social Media Act of 2025: This legislation would require the Secretary of Homeland Security and the Secretary of State to implement a strategy to combat the efforts of transnational organizations to recruit individuals in the United States via social media platforms and other online services and to assess their use of such platforms and services for illicit purposes. The American Legion urges Congress to pass this legislation as a vital component of combatting the influence of criminal organizations in the United States.

#### **AMERICANISM**

On August 26, 2025, Representative Tim Burchett (R-TN) introduced a Congressional Resolution commemorating 100 years of American Legion baseball. The resolution recognizes and honors the accomplishments of The American Legion Baseball program in mentoring young Americans in honor of the programs 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary. The American Legion's youth programs remain an integral part of the organizations mandate, and the legislative division will continue to engage with Congressional offices to honor and support these programs.

The Legislative Division is working with Representative Steve Womack (R-AR) to gather cosponsors for his Flag Protection Amendment. The Amendment was introduced June 13, 2025, as House Joint Resolution 101 and referred to the House Judiciary Committee, and currently has 23 co-sponsors. The resolution proposes an amendment to the Constitution authorizing Congress to prohibit the physical desecration of the U.S. flag. The Senate has a companion resolution S.J. Resolution 58, introduced by Senator Mike Crapo, (R-ID) on June 12, 2025.

#### **CONCLUSION**

## Marketing Commission Paul Evenson (SD), Chairman October 2025

#### **Marketing Commission Overview**

The Marketing Commission met in Indianapolis, Indiana, on October 6–7, 2025. The commission provided a comprehensive update on The American Legion's |Army–Navy Game partnership, corporate development update, and digital marketing performance.

#### **Army-Navy Game Activation**

The commission presented an in-depth review of the Army–Navy Game partnership, outlining both 2024 results and expanded plans for the 2025 activation. As the Official Veteran Service Organization of the Army–Navy Game, The American Legion continues to hold category exclusivity through 2028—leveraging this national platform to elevate awareness, rally public support for veterans, and re-energize pride across the Legion Family.

#### 2024 Recap

- 125th Meeting of Army–Navy drew 9.4 million U.S. viewers, a 31% increase from 2023 and the highest rating since 1989.
- 25 million digital and social impressions; 2.3 RTG via 309 radio affiliates; 929K streams—the most streamed Army—Navy Game on record.
- Legion's media presence reached 4 million viewers across major markets (New York, Boston, LA, Dallas) and over 61 million potential audience reach through USAA Media Row placements and bonus city branding assets in Washington, D.C.

#### 2025 A Look Ahead

- National Media Buy with CBS Sports Network: season-long Armed Forces integration, Army—Navy pre-game studio presence, and CBS Sports Digital coverage (no \$2M in-game :30 spot).
- Enhanced visibility through USAA integration as presenting sponsor—delivering added exposure and activation at no additional cost to the Legion.
- Expanded on-site fan engagement, including three branded activation zones, in-stadium signage, and premium giveaways.
- Purpose-driven fundraising campaign running Veterans Day through year-end, featuring a rivalry-themed challenge, text-to-give, and digital storytelling amplified through CBS media assets.
- Influencer Strategy: leveraging veteran creators to spark friendly rivalry and encourage donations and recruitment across social platforms.
- Membership ticket incentive and Post Watch Party support to drive recruitment and internal engagement.

#### **Partnership Objectives**

Through its partnership with the Army-Navy Game, The American Legion aims to:

- Strengthen and grow strategic relationships with key partners, lawmakers, and veteran advocates.
- Elevate brand awareness through storytelling that reflects the heart of our mission.
- Rally public support for veterans through purpose-driven fundraising.
- Re-energize pride and unity within the Legion Family.



## Marketing Commission Paul Evenson (SD), Chairman October 2025

#### **Corporate Development Update**



The commission presented the results of the Post Partner Survey that captured insights from 556 respondents across multiple posts nationwide. Key findings indicated that posts seek business solutions, fundraising support, and training resources while valuing partnerships that align with Legion values and strengthen local engagement.

#### **Survey Takeaways**

- Posts want partners integrated into existing programming—not just sponsorships.
- Members value partners who share mission alignment and community focus.
- Posts face challenges operating as sustainable businesses and would benefit from shared best practices.
- Corporate partners are seen as potential collaborators in recruitment, youth programming, and post modernization.

#### **Action Items**

- Develop a plan for evaluating and introducing post-level corporate partnerships.
- Create communication channels highlighting existing national partners and their local integration opportunities.
- Provide resources for Posts to enhance local fundraising and member engagement through partner collaboration.



## Marketing Commission Paul Evenson (SD), Chairman October 2025

#### **Digital Marketing Performance**

The commission reported continued growth in Legion.org engagement and membership conversions.

#### **Key Highlights**

- Army-Navy Game visibility spurred measurable increases in Legion.org traffic, engagement rate, and paid-search conversions. Example: organic sessions rose from 17,040 to 21,968 following media exposure on Sept. 8, 2025.
- Paid Search Campaigns for membership produced 195 conversions during early September; top creative pieces continue to outperform via humor-based and service-identity messaging.
- Influencer and Rivalry Content scheduled for rollout beginning Nov. 1 across CBS, X, Facebook, and Instagram to drive membership, donations, and awareness.

#### **Special Guests**

Past National Commander Denise Rohan provided a report on the Veterans & Children Foundation, highlighting its ongoing impact and fundraising efforts. The commission also heard from David Gay, Vice President of Business Development at Centene Corporation who provided updates on Wellcare's expanding veteran healthcare initiatives and its continued collaboration with The American Legion, reinforcing shared goas in health access and veteran well-being.

#### Summary

The Marketing Commission continues to align strategy with The American Legion's organizational priorities—Value of Membership, Diversified Revenue, and Be the One/Brand Awareness. From Army–Navy Game fully integrated activation plan to new digital engagement tools to actionable insights from the Corporate Partner survey, the commission remains focused on delivering measurable impact, building meaningful relationships, and elevating The American Legion's national presence.
